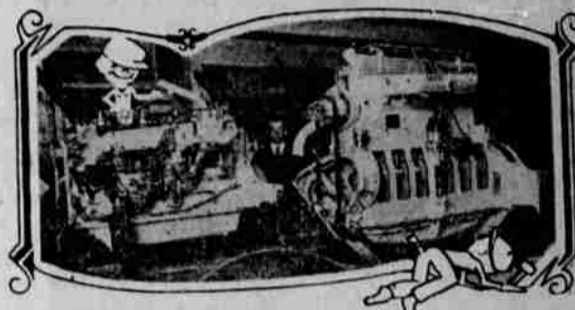

SALARY INCREASE FOR SUPERINTENDENT SMITH

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALEM, Ore., July 12.—The state board of control today increased the salary of Dr. J. N. Smith, superintendent of the state hospital for the feeble minded, from \$2500 to \$3,000 a year, and the salary of Dr. G. C. Bellinger, superintendent of the state tuberculosis hospital, from \$2800 to \$3,000.

The increases were made on the same basis by which the salaries of Dr. R. E. L. Steiner and Dr. W. D. McNary, superintendents of state hospitals for the insane at Salem and at Pendleton, were increased a few days ago. The terms state that they are to supply their own automobiles for private purposes, instead of using cars belonging to the state. Steiner and McNary were raised from \$3,000 to \$4,000 each.

Increases in the salaries of other superintendents of state institutions were discussed, but no definite action taken at today's meeting.
