## BILLION AND A HALF AMOUNT OF STATES' DEBTS

Per Capita Debt of Nation Is \$13.89 According to Financial Survey.

### OREGON IS SECOND

Only South Dakota Has Larger Debt on Percentage Basis; New York Debt Largest.

The state government of the United States have increased their bonded debt nearly 50 per cent in the past three years, according to a nation-wide survey of state finances just completed by the Bank of America, New York. The huge debt now amounts to \$1,388,742,443.63 or \$13.89 for every man, woman and child in the country. New York state's population, prosperity and great permanent improvements are reflected in its bonded debt, which aggregates \$229,910,000. The cost of its canal system, highways and bonus to war veterans give it the largest total debt of any state, although its per capita debt is comparatively low. Massachusetts is second with \$125,046,361.93, of which a large proportion represents the value of its metropolitan district improvements and highways. Following these are Illinois with a debt of \$112,071,100, North Carolina with \$109,847,000, California with \$89,153,000 and Michigan with \$82,900,000. Kentucky, Nebraska and Wisconsin have no bonded indebtedness. Kentucky owing \$67,000.28 on outstanding warrants and Wisconsin bonds indebted to its trust funds to the extent of \$1,263,700.

The highest per capita debt of any state in the Union is that of South Dakota, the share of each inhabitant being \$27.23, nearly six times as great as the national per capita debt. Oregon is second with \$22.91, or 1.64 times as much as the national debt with \$13.89. North Carolina with \$20.76, North Dakota fifth with \$18.97 and Massachusetts sixth with a per capita debt of \$19.65.

The Pacific group, comprising the states of Washington, Oregon and California, has the highest per capita debt of any section. The Bank of America finds in grouping its figures according to the geographical areas of the country, its debt per inhabitant is \$28.82, nearly twice the average for the United States. At the opposite end of the country, the New England States hold second place with a per capita debt of \$22. The Middle Atlantic group of states, New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania have a per capita debt of \$15.07 and the South Atlantic states, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and Florida are next with \$13.41.

Below the average for the country as a whole is the East North central division with a debt of \$9.48, East South Central with \$8.48, West South Central with \$6.81 and Mountain division with a debt of \$11.82 for every inhabitant. It is interesting to note, The Bank of America points out that the total bonded indebtedness of the state is, approximately, one and a half billion dollars greater than the entire Federal debt in 1916 and the per capita is \$1.07 larger.
