Funeral arrangements have not yet been announced.

**BODY BELIEVED TO BE THAT OF LOST MAN IS LOCATED**

MEDFORD, July 12.—The body of a man, thought to have been Charles Anderson, 65, of Gold Hill, missing since November 24 last, was found late Friday afternoon by James Ramsey, a prospector, on the summit of a high peak in the northern part of Jackson county, between Foothills and Kane creeks. Ramsey discovered the body lying beneath a tree while he was in search of a bee tree. Coroner H. W. Conger and Deputy Sheriff Forrester removed the remains to Gold Hill late today.

It was impossible to identify Anderson, except from his clothes, and the garments answer perfectly to the description given by his wife as what he wore when he left home. It was a habit of Anderson to carry a stub of a pencil in his vest pocket, according to his wife, and one was found there. A nickel was also found in the clothing.

**LOOKOUT KILLED, 55 FIRES SET BY ELECTRIC STORM**

 PRIEST RIVER, Idaho, July 12.—Paul Blikenorfer, lookout at South Baldy ranger station, north of Priest lake, was killed, and 55 forest fires were set, by the electrical storm which struck north of here Sunday. One hundred and fifty men are on the scene fighting the fires, and two airplane forest patrol, one from Spokane and one from Missoula, Mont., are on their way to help the fire arresters.

Blikenorfer was a student at the University of Idaho. His father is a physician at Cincinnati, Ohio. Young Blikenorfer had worked two seasons in the forest service. He was sleeping on the floor of the lookout cabin, having given up his bed to visiting forest officials, when killed. No other in the cabin were injured.

McKinley, of Myrtle Creek. The funeral services will be conducted at the Catholic church, Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, with interment in the Catholic cemetery.

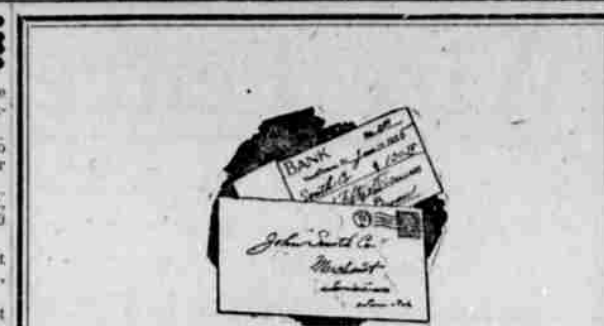

**MARKETS**

(Associated Press Landed Wire.)  
 PORTLAND, July 13.—Arrivals of the country dressed meats along the street this morning were negligible and the already strong market was given further impetus by the shortage. Buyers are looking for top calves and hogs and good stock is snapped up quickly. There is a keen demand for supplies this week, especially for the hotel and restaurant trade and buyers are securing the market in order to meet the convention requirements.

Choice light calves sell readily at 15 to 15 1/2 cents with an occasional fancy veal bringing a half cent more. Choice light hogs are up to 19 and 19 1/2 cents and holding firm. There is also a brisk call for all lines of poultry and prices are slowly working higher. Light hens are up to 18 cents with heavier at 24 to 25 cents. White springs 18 1/2 to 19 cents with colored stock up to 25 cents.

Butter and eggs were generally steady and unchanged at opening of week. Receipts were moderate and demand good.

The wool market is steady at the opening of the week. Recent sales made at 25 cents for poorer grade to as high as 40 cents for fancy stuff. Around 200,000 pounds have been purchased around Hopper by the E. J. Burke company.

A two-cent advance in hams and bacon is effective today. Best sugar cured hams now 24 to 25 cents; picnic up a cent at 23 to 24 a pound. Best bacon now quoted at 46 to 48 cents.
