KITCHEN CUPBOARD— By NELLIE MAXWELL
Seasonable Good Things— NOW that the fields are full of the delicious mushroom, free to any for the gathering, let us indulge in:
Creamed Mushrooms.—Brush one-half pound of fresh mushrooms, wipe the caps and cut the stems into small pieces. Cook the stems in butter for five minutes, then let them simmer while the caps are being broiled with a bit of butter in each. Add a cupful of cream then the steamed stems and serve with the broiled caps as a sauce.
Pet Roasted Rabbit.—Dress and clean two rabbits and disjoint the pieces ready for roasting. Cover with cold water to which a tablespoonful of salt and one of vinegar has been added, and let stand several hours. Drain, wipe dry and roll in seasoned flour. Put in iron deep Scotch kettle with an iron cover, add a slice of pork and try out the fat slowly; cover tightly. Add a tablespoonful of water if the meat gets too dry, and cook until tender, seasoning toward the last of the cooking.
Quick Nut Bread.—Mix and sift two cupfuls of bread flour, and one-half cupful of sugar, four teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one teaspoonful of salt. Add three tablespoonfuls of softened butter and two of lard; one egg, well-beaten, one cupful of milk and one cupful of walnut meats coarsely chopped. Beat thoroughly and turn into a buttered pan. Let stand twenty minutes, then bake in a moderate oven.
Veal Loaf.—Take three pounds of lean veal and one-half pound of uncooked ham, chop both rather fine, add one teaspoonful of salt and one-half teaspoonful of pepper, three soda crackers rolled fine, then add three beaten eggs three tablespoonfuls of cream and two tablespoonfuls of boiling water. Mix all together thoroughly. Grease a bread pan and press the mixture into it. Cover and bake one hour in a moderate oven. Uncover and brown, baking another half hour.
New Carrot Salad.—Put a few carrots through the meat grinder, add a little chopped onion and more chopped celery, a few nuts, finely minced and very well moistened with a good mayonnaise on lettuce.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 15.—Current receipt eggs are a cent lower at 32 cents net on the dairy exchange.
Other graded stock remain steady and unchanged. Buyers are paying around 31 cents for receipt eggs delivered along the coast.
Undergrade butter is easier today although high scores which is still scarce and in demand. On the dairy exchange prime firsts cubes are a cent lower at 43 cents and firsts a half cent at 42 cents. Extras and standards are steady.

GERMAN CABINET AGREES ON PLAN FOR PEACE PACT

BERLIN, July 15.—The German cabinet today agreed upon the tentative text of its reply to the French note regarding Germany's reply Friday at a conference of the cabinet with the Reichstag's foreign relations committee and the promoters of the federated states of Germany.
The French note, representing an Anglo-French agreement, replied to Germany's suggestion in February for a security pact protecting the frontiers of western Europe.
