25,000 JOBS FOR VETERANS

There are now 25,000 rehabilitated World War veterans who need jobs. A drive to find places for them in industry has been started by the National Association of Manufacturers.

No undue consideration is asked for these men. They have been so trained that they have a distinct pride in their ability to stand on their own feet and render a service fully equal to the compensation they get.

It would seem as if the business concerns that get these men would be fortunate. Much money has been spent on their training, and they ought to know the most modern ways of performing various kinds of work and exercising management.

The hard experiences they have been through ought to make them a very determined type of fellows. They have fought a war successfully, and they should be equally able to fight the battles of peace. They would take their duties seriously, and have the same spirit of earnestness they showed as soldiers.

It is very common for workers to take their jobs in a trifling way, looking at them merely as a method of earning spending money, and they are anxious all day to see the clock hands move round so they can quit and go in for the sports. The business men all know that type, and they have had to employ too many of them.

These veterans' first anxiety will be to make good and make themselves useful to their employers.

It would seem a lasting reproach on this country if these men are allowed to remain idle long. They gave us everything they had, and went into battle so that our country could maintain its ideals safe from interference. We now owe them a great debt. That can never be repaid by money. But we can see to it that the doors of industry open to them and they are given a chance.

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DERN FOULS BILLY EDWARDS IN MATCH AND LOSES DECISION

 PORTLAND, July 16.—Ira Dern, Salt Lake wrestler, knocked out Billy Edwards, Kansas City, in the second "round" of their wrestling match here last night. Edwards was awarded the match. Dern took the first fall in eight and a half minutes and about twenty-five minutes after he resumed wrestling Dern landed on Edward's chin with a husky right and Edwards dropped to the mat insensible. Referee Clark in awarding Edwards the decision declared Dern's act the worst foul he had ever seen committed in a wrestling match.

PRUSSIAN DECREE DIRECTS LICENSING MUSIC TEACHERS
 BERLIN, July 16.—(A. P.)—All music teachers in Prussia are henceforth to be licensed, according to the latest decree issued by the government.

"A degree of order and uniformity of qualification in a world hitherto beset by many charlatans and opportunists may be expected from such a decree," says the Vorwaerts, which describes how private musical instructors had become a very negligible quantity during the war and subsequently in the inflation period and that on the whole the government unfortunately had never considered music as significant for educational purposes.

The decree mentions that "a decisive change may now be expected in musical education." All private music teachers under a certain age, providing they have not graduated from some accredited musical institution, will be obliged to pass an examination. They will then be supplied with an official license to teach music. Without such a license no teacher is to be allowed to give instructions.

FORD BIDS HIGH FOR SCRAPPED VESSELS
 (Associated Press Leased Wire.)
 WASHINGTON, July 16.—Henry Ford today offered \$1,706,000 for the 209 shipping board vessels set aside for scrapping.

His bid compares with \$1,370,000 offered by the Boston Iron and Metal company of Baltimore, when a previous set of bids were opened June 30. The Baltimore company's tender was favored by President Palmer of the fleet corporation, but rejected by the shipping board which called for new proposals.

THREE MEN PAY FINES IN CASES BOUGHT BY PATROL

Three men paid fines in various justice courts today for carelessness or neglect in handling fires in the woods. C. C. Ewing of Oakland, appeared this morning before Justice of the Peace J. J. Brown at Yoncalla, and entered a plea of guilty to burning a slash without a permit. He paid a fine of \$25 and costs. At Gardiner Justice of the Peace Gray imposed a fine of \$25 and costs on P. Peterson, who set fire to a yellow jacket nest and allowed the fire to escape into timber belonging to the Gardner Mill company. Allen Wilson paid a fine of \$5 and costs, following a plea of guilty in the court of Justice of the Peace George Jones, where he was charged with leaving a camp fire unattended.

MAYOR PLANS TO REORGANIZE DEPARTMENTS

City Maintenance Force Will Be Created With Geo. Grimm Supt.

TO COMBINE WORK

Street Repair Crew Will Also Handle Cleaning Work Using New Power Flusher.

A reorganization of the city street cleaning, repair and maintenance departments was announced this morning by Mayor George E. Houck, and will become effective in the near future. The change is made necessary by the new equipment procured by the city, which will require the shifting about of a number of employees to meet the new conditions which will be brought about by the equipment soon to be received.

George Grimm, now superintendent of the street cleaning department, will be made head of the city maintenance department, which is to take over the general repair and upkeep of sewers, parks, parkings, etc. George Frew, now in charge of the street repair work, will take over the street cleaning in connection with his present work.

The city is purchasing a street flusher, which will do away with the extensive operations now necessary in cleaning the streets. The flusher, which is a huge tank mounted on a motor truck with a power plant for delivering water under heavy pressure on the streets, can be operated by a small crew and can cover much more territory in a day than is possible with the old sprinkler, squeegee and scraper now in use. The flusher also cleans the streets in a more thorough manner and with less dust.

Mr. Frew is now in charge of the street repair department, which is busy patching the pavements with the new paving plant which the city recently procured. Under the new system he will have complete charge of all street work including both the repair and the cleaning.

Mr. Grimm's work in the future will include all general maintenance work. He is now required to do much of that work, and his task has grown to such an extent that it is very difficult for his force to handle their numerous duties. By putting all street work under one department, and creating a new organization for maintenance work, it is believed by Mayor Houck, that the employees will be able to handle their duties in a very efficient way.

The maintenance crew, under Mr. Grimm, will have charge of the cleaning out of all sewers, catch basins, and the repair work on sewers, together with the care of the city parks and parkings, and the cleaning up of the weed and grass infested areas, after the legal notice has been given in compliance with the city ordinance. This department will also take care of the general city work which is continually arising, putting all of this class of labor under one head.

NEW RULER OF ELKS INSTALLED TODAY OUTLINES PROGRAM

PORTLAND, Ore., July 16.—Judge William Hawley Atwell of Dallas, Texas, installed today as grand exalted ruler of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, announced a policy of economy in his address to the grand lodge in sixty-first annual reunion here. He also declared for observance of the laws of the country and its order.

"There is no decency without an obedience to the laws of the country," he said. "Let every Elk be able to look at the American flag each morning and say 'Good morning, old Glory—I was decent yesterday and last night.'"

"Please, put from your mind any thoughts of lavish banquets, heavy entertainments or the like. The grand exalted ruler will not visit a lodge to be entertained. And do not be disappointed if your grand exalted ruler shall choose to visit the smaller, rather than the larger lodges. That man who is prosperous, does not need our help, neither do the larger lodges."

"And further: It is my purpose to save you money. I expect to exact—I believe, I am boss now—from all past grand exalted rulers a promise to share with me the burden of visitations. Why should I travel from Texas to make a visit to Maine if there is some one in New York who can do the service equally well?"

Thousands of visiting Elks from all parts of the country with their bands and drum corps marched at the annual parade this afternoon. There were several spectacular features, including stunts by cowboys from Pendleton, Oregon, and Dallas, Texas.
