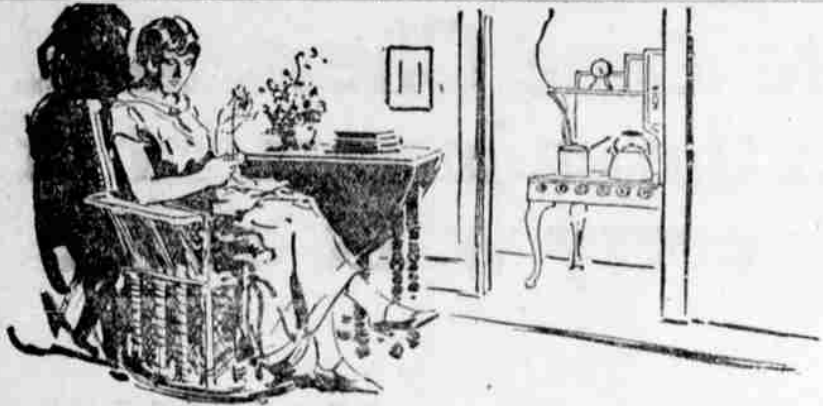
FIVE AMERICANS ARE INJURED IN SMASH

MEDFORD MEN TO RECEIVE SENTENCE

(Associated Press Local Wire.) MEDFORD, Ore., July 16.—Sentence will be passed next Tuesday morning by Circuit Judge C. M. Thomas, upon T. Eddy, local junk dealer, convicted Tuesday after a short deliberation by the jury, of a statutory offense involving a ten-year-old Gold Hill girl. A motion filed this morning by the attorneys for Eddy, asking that the verdict be set aside on technical grounds was denied by the court. A maximum sentence of 15 years can be imposed on Eddy.

H. Dawson, found guilty Monday on an indictment charging aiding and abetting in the sale of liquor while armed, will also be sentenced Tuesday morning.

The state in its opening statement, said the evidence would show that Hodges had ridden in an automobile from Keno, Klamath county, with a revolver in a holster over his shoulder and that when he made delivery of a keg of liquor at "The Hut," a refreshment parlor located near Camp Jackson, on the Crater Lake highway, he had removed the gun, and left it in the front seat of the car.

ASHLAND CHURCH FIGHT IS RENEWED

(Associated Press Local Wire.) MEDFORD, Ore., July 16.—The religious controversy that has burned since last October between factions of the Baptist faith in Ashland, flared anew yesterday, when members of the Ashland Baptist church, holding to the tenets of the established Baptist church, took possession of the church, which hitherto has been held by the First Baptist Church which claims to be the Almses McPherson "four square gospel."

Entrance to the church, except in public meetings is denied all followers of the "four square gospel," the Rev. H. C. Miller, leader of this faction is still in the parsonage, however.

According to Rev. Miller, no action will be taken by his flock to regain the house of worship.

The religious row has been in the courts since last December and arguments on a motion to strike and elucidate on paragraphs of the original complaint, have been called for next Monday. What effect the latest action will have on the legal procedure is not known.

JAPANESE SYNDICATE FORMED TO EXPLOIT COAL AND OIL FIELDS

TOKYO, July 16.—The government authorities are reported to have reached an agreement on the proposed formation of a semi-official syndicate for the exploitation of the Saghalien coal and oil fields. The oil syndicate will have a capital of 10,000,000 yen and the coal syndicate will be capitalized for 10,000,000 yen.

Half of the capital is to be invested by the Japanese Red, white and black syndicates incorporated in Saghalien, and the North Szechuen Industrial Company, and the remainder will be offered for general subscription. The Imperial Navy will purchase the entire oil output. Only Japanese subjects will be allowed to subscribe for shares.

MacMILLAN CREW HAVING TOUGH LUCK

(Associated Press Local Wire.) WASHINGTON, July 16.—The crew of the MacMillan Arctic ship Bowdoin is having a difficult time repairing the broken snow-blower of the vessel at Hopalong, Labrador, Commander MacMillan reported in a radio message received today by the National Geographic Society. It apparently

was filed last night. "We are making our third attempt to put on spare propeller," he said. "The evil spirit of the north, so familiar to the Eskimos, has temporarily turned all of his attention to the white visitors from the south. Unfortunately we are having tides with a rise and fall of only four feet. To raise our broken propeller above water we have shifted all the deck load to the bow of the boat."

"Even this failed to accomplish our object, therefore tonight we placed four large empty casks under the stern of the Bowdoin, hoping that when the tide rises, they will lift the Bowdoin at least six inches."

"With the thermometer at 70 degrees Fahrenheit and swarms of mosquitoes getting into our ears, eyes, mouths and noses, you can imagine our difficulties in comparison to which ice packs, ice bergs, thick fog and gales of wind are a trifle and even looked forward to with pleasure. Our only encouragement is that the height of the tides is increasing, which means that ultimately the job will be done."

MERCURY REACHES HIGH MARKS OVER PORTIONS OF STATE

(Associated Press Local Wire.) KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 16.—At 1 o'clock this afternoon, the thermometer here registered 93 degrees with every indication that it would top the century mark by late this afternoon. At Romanza, 20 miles in the valley, it had reached 101 at 11 o'clock this morning.

KLAMATH FALLS, July 16.—With the thermometer touching 93 at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon, prospects this morning were that this high mark of the year would be equalled or even bettered today. Storm clouds which appeared on the horizon at daybreak were disappearing, and the air was sultry at 3 o'clock this morning.

MEDFORD, Ore., July 16.—Yesterday was the hottest day this month in Medford when the mercury reached 103 1/2, and the minimum of 63 early this morning makes a new high record for the year. Early this morning there was a brief shower which laid the dust and lowered the temperature. While the prediction for today is warmer, the local weather bureau believes that clouds and haze will keep the maximum down below that of yesterday.

NEW KEEPER FOR STATE PEN NAMED

SALEM, Ore., July 16.—Warden A. M. Dalrymple, today named M. M. Miller, principal of the Oregon state prison to succeed C. M. Charlton, resigned. Miller has been a guard of the Oregon prison for the past year. He was formerly a guard at the Washington state prison and later an engineer for the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company at their Wendling plant.

STATE OF WASHINGTON SPENDING MILLIONS FOR HIGHWAY BUILDING.

SEATTLE, July 16.—More than \$17,000,000 are to be spent on Washington state's pay-as-you-go road building program during the coming biennium. Of this sum it is estimated \$13,500,000 will be available from licenses for motor vehicles, and a tax of two cents a gallon on gasoline; \$2,750,000 from Federal aid, and nearly \$500,000 from forest funds. Four bridges on the Pacific Highway between Everett and Marysville, in the Northwestern section of the state, will absorb \$1,000,000.

During the past 20 years Washington state has appropriated \$30,000,000 for highways, and received \$100,000,000 from the Federal aid fund, and has 2,460 miles of improved highways to show for its money. Of this mileage 537 are paved and 1,770 graveled.
