## PRESIDENT IS PLEASED OVER BUSINESS OUTLOOK

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 16.—President Coolidge is optimistic over the present outlook for business. He is keeping a close watch on business conditions and in a conference today with Charles D. Hillis, republican national committeeman from New York expressed his satisfaction with the situation. The president is receiving reports on business conditions as well as government affairs at his summer home here. Mr. Hillis also gave an enthusiastic report on the business outlook in the east.  
Mr. Hillis who is mentioned as a possible successor to Secretary Weeks, should the latter feel unable to return to his post from his sick bed in the fall, said he did not discuss politics.  
Referring to reports that he was a possible candidate for governor of New York, Mr. Hillis said he could not decline a position which has not been offered to him.
