ELKS VISIT CITY ON WAY BACK FROM THE CONVENTION

Hundreds of Elks on their return from the national convention at Portland stopped in Roseburg today. A number of trains went through last night, and others will pass through the city this evening, the exodus continuing over Saturday.

Pennsylvania, Buffalo, Indiana, Connecticut, Jersey City and Cincinnati Elks went through the city early this morning, while Dallas, Texas and Philadelphia trains reached the city shortly after 10 o'clock. Both of these trains remained here for an hour or more, giving the visitors a chance to inspect portions of the city.

New York and New England Elks will reach here this evening, and Miami, Florida, Pasadena and Los Angeles trains will pass through early in the morning. In addition to these there are small groups traveling on the regular trains which are being operated in several sections.

A troop train carrying California National Guardsmen will pass through the city tomorrow.

POULTRYMEN TO HOLD CONVENTION

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, July 17.—The third annual convention of Oregon poultrymen will be held at the state college July 22 to 23. Speakers, considered authorities in their field, will be present to discuss questions of interest to the poultrymen. Governor Walter M. Pierce will address the convention Wednesday on "Oregon's Agricultural Outlook," while W. A. Lippincott, professor of poultry husbandry at the University of California, will discuss "Principles of Poultry Breeding."

The poultry department at the college maintains two farms. The home farm is located on the campus and is used for student practice work and demonstrations. The south farm, used for experiment station breeding work, is located south of the home plant. Demonstrations will be given at both plants during the convention.

Delegates who attended the convention last year feel it is of great importance to be present. One poultryman wrote that the information gained last year saved him \$600. Many poultry keepers look upon the convention as a vacation—three days filled with information of great value.

In addition to the regular program of lectures and demonstrations, recreational features have been planned. Among the social features will be a "get acquainted" hour at supper from 5 to 7:20 o'clock. Baseball, backyard golf, and picnic lunches will offer recreation to vary the program. Meals will also be served at the cafeteria in Waldo hall.

Other speakers will be H. E. Coyle, extension specialist in poultry husbandry at the college; H. S. Durbin, president of the Pacific Poultry Producers' association; F. E. Fox, associate professor of poultry husbandry at the college; H. E. Hayslop, professor of farm crops; James T. Jardine, director of the experiment station; W. T. Johnson, poultry pathologist of the experiment station; J. L. Knowlton, poultry husbandman of the station; A. G. Lamm, professor of poultry husbandry; R. T. Reed, college editor; and H. A. Schmidt, assistant agronomist of the United States department of agriculture.
