WILD TURKEYS TO BE PLANTED IN THIS COUNTY

Game Commission Raising Fowls at State Farm Near Eugene.

GUN CLUB WILL HELP

Douglas County Believed to Be Best Adapted in State for Successful Propagation.

Oregon may be the home of wild turkeys if experiments now being carried on at the game farms result successfully. Several years ago an effort was made to plant wild turkeys in Oregon, but was not followed up to a point to determine whether or not the birds were given sufficient advantage necessary for them to thrive in their new habitat. Several districts of Oregon seem favorable climatically and topographically, besides having an abundance of food suitable to these birds.

The wild turkey is nothing more or less than a member of the pheasant family, and an earnest effort will be made at this time to determine whether or not they can really be propagated in Oregon. A shipment of three dozen eggs has been received from Ohio and placed at the game farms near Eu-

gene and Corvallis. This shipment of eggs will be followed by other egg allotments and with several pairs of birds to be used in the experiment. The rearing and planting of a few birds in certain localities is not considered giving them a fair chance. It is the object of the game commission at this time to continue their planting of these birds until it is determined whether or not they will adapt themselves to Oregon conditions. Moose have been successfully planted in Oregon from the Alaska coast and have developed into wonderful specimens. The ring-necked pheasant has taken hold to such an extent in the state that it is now the premier bird for upland shooting. The Hungarian partridge, another imported bird, is a close second, and there is no reason why the wild turkey should not also thrive at certain well selected points.

The Roseburg Rod and Gun club is vitally interested in the experiment which the game commission is making. Douglas county is the section of the state best fitted, climatically and in all other respects, to successfully raise wild turkeys, it is believed. Its many thousands of acres of upland range afford fine feeding grounds, while its mild temperatures would be conducive to the growth of the young fowls.

Douglas county is the premier county for domestic turkeys, which grow here with the least care and attention of any place in the country and reach the best size and quality. As conditions for growth are practically the same between the domestic and wild fowl, there is no reason why the wild turkey should not prosper in Douglas county and become a valuable asset to the sporting resources of this county, already noted for its wild life.

The Rod and Gun club has been quite active in fostering this experiment and when the birds are ready to be released, will endeavor to have a large number of them brought to Douglas county. The club will endeavor to see that the birds are properly protected and will try to keep a check on them to see the measure of success that attends the experiment.

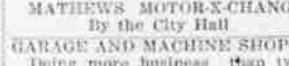

STATE MONOPOLY OF SUGAR AND TEA PROPOSED BY PERSIA

BAGDAD, July 16.—Decision of the Persian government to put through a bill to empower it to take over the import and sale of tea and sugar in Persia as a state monopoly has aroused considerable feeling in commercial circles here. The seriousness of the matter from the local point of view may be gauged from the fact that, except for cotton piece goods, a very large proportion of the considerable re-export trade from this country to Persia consists of tea and sugar. The buying arrangements in Europe and India have until now remained in the hands of Bagdad middlemen. Persian merchants not as a rule buying further afield than this city. Presumably the Persian government intends to make its own arrangements in Europe, and to cut out the Bagdad middleman altogether.
