(Associated Press Licensed Wire.) LONDON, July 18.—American track athletes from the middle-west ably aided by the eastern sprinting flash, Loren Murchison of the Newark A. C., took a full share of honors in the annual British Amateur Athletic Association, championship's concluded at Stamford bridge this afternoon.

Harold Osborn, outstanding star of the invading team from the Illinois Athletic Club won the high jump with a brilliant leap of 6 feet 4 inches, besides leading in the other nine events in which he was entered.

Murchison raced home to win both dashes, taking the 100 in 9.9-10 seconds and the 220 in 21.5-5 seconds.

MARK BROOM WINS ROUND IN COURT BOUT OVER CAR

EUGENE, Ore., July 17.—A jury in circuit court yesterday returned a verdict to the effect that Mark Broom, alleged moonshiner, did not transport liquor in his car on the night of June 1, when he was arrested, but that liquor was kept or concealed in the car with his knowledge.

The case was tried to ascertain whether or not there was enough evidence that Broom was transporting liquor to warrant confiscating the car. The jury was called to act as adviser to the court and was directed to answer the following questions:

1. "Did Mark Broom on June 1, transport liquor in said car?" The answer was "No." 2. "Was intoxicating liquor kept or concealed in the car with his knowledge of Broom?" The answer was "Yes." 3. "Were exhibits A, B, and C (bottles of liquor) placed in the car by a man named Bafford or Brown with the knowledge of Broom?" The answer was "No." The claim was made by Broom that a stool pigeon placed the liquor in the car. Judge Skipworth will decide upon the points of law in the case later. DENVER KLAN QUILTS NATIONAL BODY IS NEWSPAPER REPORT

DENVER, Colo., July 18.—The Denver Times today says that three executives of the Ku Klux Klan are enroute to Denver by airplane from Washington, D. C., as a result of the reported action of the Denver Klan last night in voting to secede from the national organization.

William Zumburn, national attorney for the Klan, and two other executives whose names were not divulged are the officials who will arrive here tomorrow, the newspaper says.

The action, the Times says, came after Denver Klan officials received a telegram from Hiram Wesley Evans, Imperial Wizard, advising them all money and property of the Klan was to be held and released only upon signature of national officials.

The Rocky Mountain News today declared that the secessionists voted to join an organization known as the Minute Men of America, which was incorporated here recently immediately after they withdrew, and elected Dr. John Galen Locke, Grand Dragon of the Colorado Klan, to head the body.

The Times says that 14 other local Klan organizations took similar action last night, surrendering their charters to the national body. The papers also declare that a portion of the Denver Klansmen have decided to "stand pat" and continue as a part of the national body. Recently Denver papers declared that Dr. Locke had been requested to resign as head of the state body by Atlanta, Ga., officials, but remained in office, when the klansmen protested against his removal.

Dr. Locke recently served a ten days jail sentence and was fined \$1,500 for contempt of federal court, when he failed to produce his books for inspection in connection with an investigation of his income tax returns by internal revenue agents.

ACCUSED LIQUOR PEDDLERS TO FACE ADDITIONAL CHARGE

MEDFORD, Ore., July 18.—The jury in the trial of Mr. and Mrs. B. Dawson and Mr. and Mrs. B. J. Hodges, all of Klamath Falls, charged with transporting liquor in an automobile, late Friday afternoon, after an hour's deliberation, returned a verdict of guilty against the husbands and acquitted their wives. The women are mothers.

The two couples will all go on trial Monday morning and face a jury on charges of possession of liquor, the last indictments brought against them by the last grand jury.

Hodges and Dawson were convicted this week at separate trials, of "selling liquor while armed." The trials grew out of the raid on "The Hut" a candy store established on the Crater Lake highway near Camp Jackson, during the National Guard encampment last June. The Hodges and Dawsons were arrested during the delivery of two 10-gallon kegs of moonshine.

It was brought out from the testimony that "The Hut" was established by the district attorney's office, stocked and placed in charge of a man by the name of Holbrook, with instructions to buy all the liquor he could.

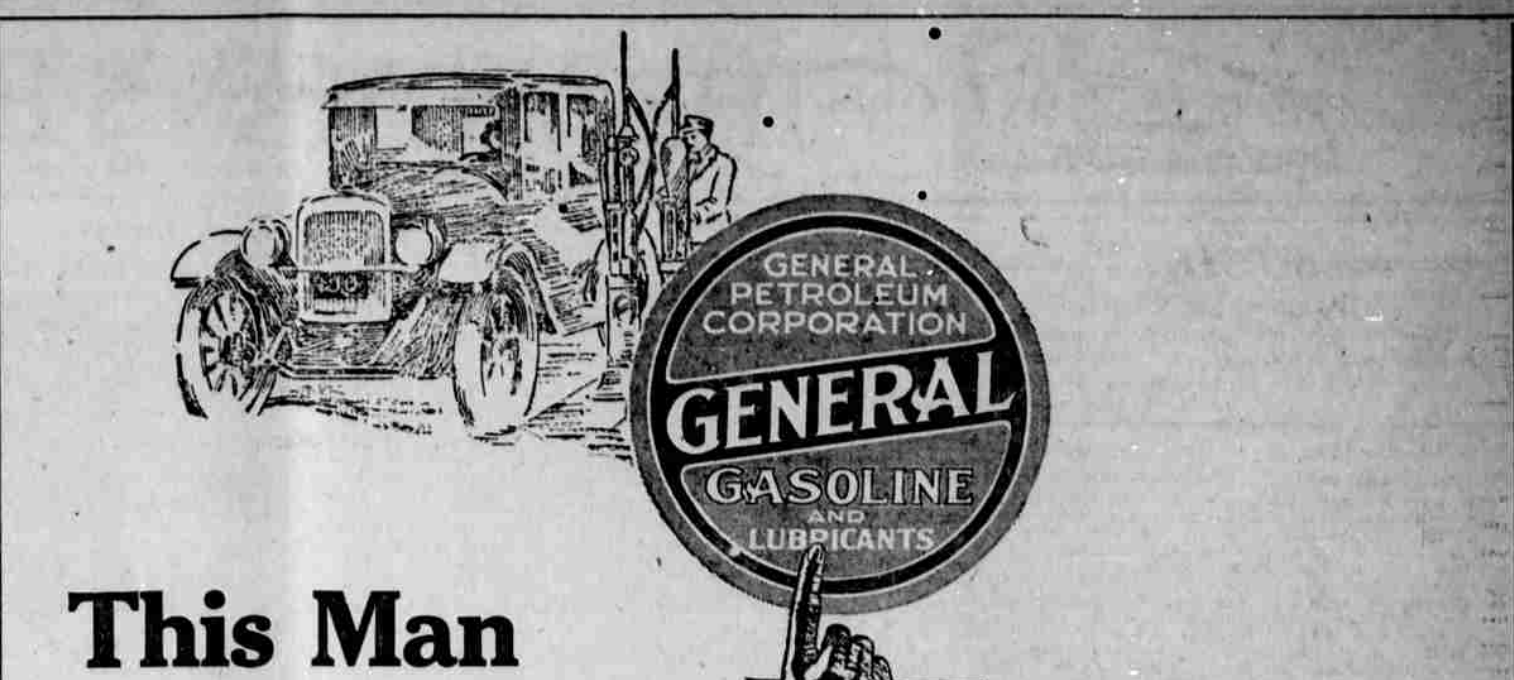

SPECIAL TRAINS KNIGHT TEMPLARS TO PASS THRU CITY

KEEFE CARTER WINS OVER RUSSELL MARTIN.

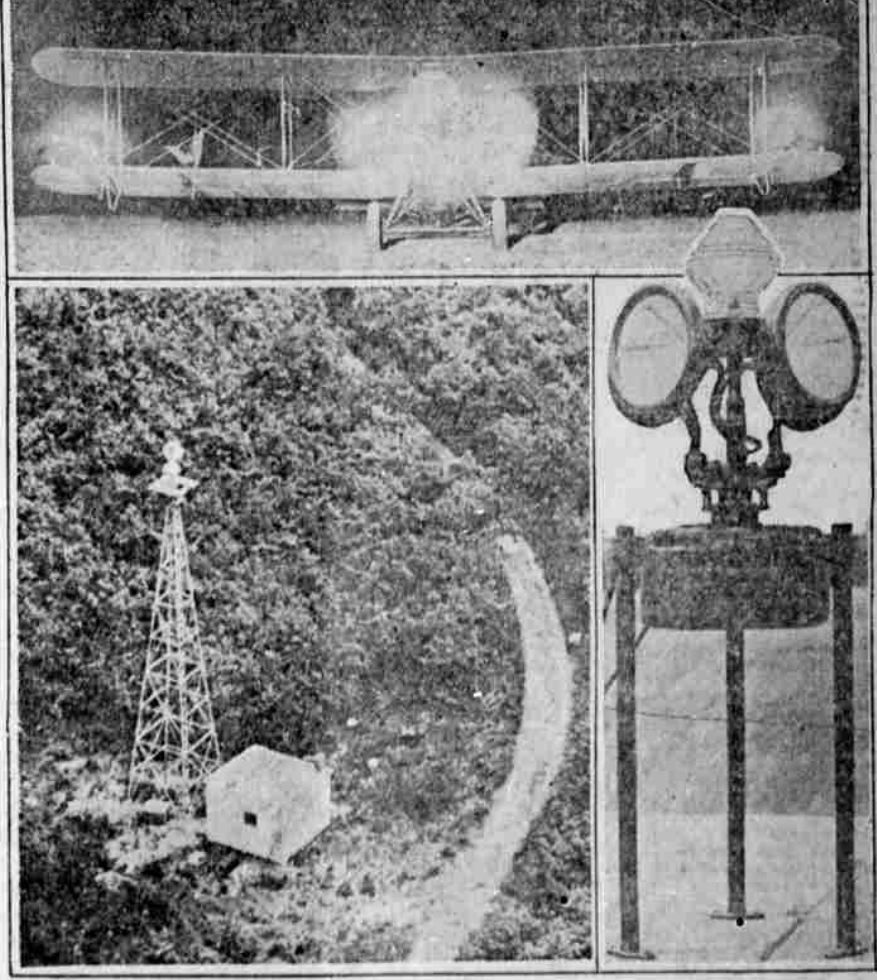

OREGON MINERAL OUTPUT IN 1924 SHOWS DECREASE

WASHINGTON, July 17.—Oregon mines of gold, silver, copper and lead, together produced ores worth \$678,000 in 1924, according to figures announced by the department of commerce, a decrease of \$89,000 from the previous year. Baker county led with \$141,900. Grant was next, with \$178,000, then Josephine, with \$22,000 and Jackson, Malheur, Curry and Lane in the order named.
