FIRE DEPARTMENT WILL BURN OFF BIG GRASS TRACTS

The Roseburg fire department has been ordered by Mayor George Houck to burn off the grassy areas of the city. In the southern and northern portions of the city there are several large tracts covered with tall grass, which each year, usually about the first of August, burn off, causing danger to the surrounding residences. This year in order to eliminate the hazard, the fire department will burn over these sections, having sufficient apparatus on hand to keep the fire under control. A device has been rigged up by Chief Fletcher, which will enable the men doing this work to use water on a large area. Couplings have been made so that water can be taken from a fire hydrant, through a coupler hose, and then reduced until a garden hose may be used. Tests have been made showing that an excellent pressure can be secured through several hundred feet of this hose.

HOOP SNAKES AND KIN DECLARED BUNK

WASHINGTON, July 18.—Biologists of the department of agriculture declared today that the time-honored yarns about "hoop snakes," "stinging snakes" and "glass snakes" are bunk.

The story of snakes that give chase by crawling their horned tails in their mouths and rolling like hoops is a fable, they say. The so-called stinging snake hasn't any sting, the biologists credit origin of the story to existence of a snake having a fine pointed tail.

The "glass" or jointed snake, said to have the power to disjoin and wedge off in all directions when attacked and later reassemble itself, is nothing, they declare, but a harmless, legless lizard that has the faculty of dropping its tail when in danger of being seized by that member. The tail is replaced by a short, imperfect appendage.

OREGON EDITORS TAKE NO STAND ON EVOLUTION MOVE

GRANTS PASS, Ore., July 18.—Oregon State Editorial Association in annual convention today refused to take a stand on the evolution question. It tallied two resolutions, one of which declared against passage of any law restricting either religion or education and another deploring "tendency to create from evolution discussion, a political issue." The first resolution was proposed by Professor C. J. McIntosh of the Oregon Agricultural College and declared the Editorial Association was opposed to any movement to introduce the Tennessee evolution fight into Oregon. The second resolution was proposed by A. E. Koenig, of Oregon City, who asserted he had been informed that a movement was on foot to make the evolution question a political issue.

A. L. Mallory of the Okanogan, Oregon, Tribune, was elected president of the association and H. C. Hoss, Oregon City, secretary-treasurer.
