WOMAN WHO WAS CRUEL TO BABES GETS SENTENCE

Proprietress of Infant Home Admits Bad Treatment to Children in Care.

53 DIE IN THE HOME

Had Strangled, Frozen and Disposed of Infants, Says Report of Probation Officer.

NEW YORK, July 22.—Mrs. Helen Auguste Geisen-Volk, proprietress of an East 86th street home for infants, today was sentenced to three and a half to seven years in Auburn prison on a charge of baby substitution, to which she had pleaded guilty.

A probation officer's report, submitted to the court before sentence was pronounced, characterized her as a "woman without conscience," who had "strangled, frozen to death and otherwise disposed of infants left in her care."

The report said that since February, 1918, at least 53 infants had died while in Mrs. Geisen-Volk's charge. It alleged that she treated children in any way it meant financial benefit to herself, that she destroyed children for a consideration and non-paying babies because they were liabilities.

"She had no maternal affections, at least with respect to the babies of other people," the report said. "To her they were puppies, articles of merchandise to be bartered or exchanged."

Mrs. Geisen-Volk was arrested last May when she attempted to give a strange baby to William Angerer, a steamfitter's assistant, in place of the seven-month-old son he had placed in her care.

Judge McIntyre asked her in court today what she did with the missing baby and the reply was, "It died and I left it in a hallway in a satchel."

"Why did you do that?" asked the judge.

"Because one of the relatives of the baby asked me to," was the reply.

EMERGENCY CREWS TO FIGHT FIRES

WASHINGTON, July 22.—A resident of Tomahawk, Wis., has written Postmaster General New:
"I read in the newspapers that thousands of dollars are found in dead letters. I'm just thinking as the owners of a large number are unknown, I trust that it is God's will that I could have a small part of this—only sixty or seventy thousand dollars. I surely thank you unspeakably for the kind favor by sending me a bank draft within 10 days. May the dear Lord bless us more and more at all times."

Emergency forest fire crews are a new feature of the Forest Service protective organization in the Pacific Northwest this year, according to announcement just made by District Forester C. M. Granger.
Each crew or squadron consists of one forest fire chief, two or three fire foremen, one camp superintendent and one cook. They are located at strategic points in the forest fire regions, and will be used only to direct the work on large fires. Each squadron is supplied with motor transport for a quick getaway, and is in telephone communication with the Forest Supervisor's headquarters. During the time they are not actually needed on forest fires, they will work on road and bridge building and other forest improvements.
"When a bad forest fire period develops," said Mr. Granger, "one of the greatest difficulties is to secure experienced men to take charge of the work. We hope to simplify this problem through the newly organized squadrons, which will give us the skeleton organization for handling a large crew efficiently. Action, and immediate action,—is the first requirement in fire fighting. The smoldering cigarette stub, easily pinched before being thrown away, may require hundreds of men to put it out,—if it is not put out while small."
The squadrons are located as follows: Mount Hood Loop Road, Fire Chief C. C. Hon, covering the
