LIGHTNING FATAL TO FOUR IN TWO STATES YESTERDAY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

NEW YORK, July 23.—Four persons were killed by lightning in metropolitan New York and south New Jersey yesterday. Crops of tobacco, hay and grain were flattened by a severe rainstorm in New England and upstate New York.

A 14-year-old boy was killed by lightning in Brooklyn when he attempted to climb a tree to dislodge a kite. A woman was killed at her sewing machine in Somers Point, N. J. A laborer was killed under a tree at the Swanooy golf club and a soldier killed while on duty at Fort Slocum.

There were no fatalities in New England, but the storm late yesterday swept down barns, flooded streets and cellars and washed out railroad tracks. Trolley service and wire communication were impeded.

President Coolidge and his party on the Mayflower were caught in the storm during their trip to Pemberton, Mass., and experienced rough going.

EUGENE PIPE LINE BIDS ARE REJECTED

EUGENE, Ore., July 23.—All bids for the construction of the McKenzie river pipe line, entailing a new water supply for Eugene, were rejected at a meeting of the water board last evening. Justice to bidders who expressed a wish to enter new bids was given as the cause. It was also said that lower bids would in all probability be received when new bids are called. The estimated cost of the work is \$275,000.

Nine bidders entered the field. Elimination of bids on all but steel pipe line will be affected when the new bids are called for.

THREE FIRES CAUSE BIG PROPERTY LOSS IN MEDFORD TODAY

MEDFORD, Ore., July 23.—An epidemic of fires struck Medford yesterday and this morning and caused the destruction of a church, a residence and a barn with an estimated loss of \$15,000, partially covered by insurance.

The causes of none of the fires has been determined.

The Seventh Day Adventist church on North Riverside was completely gutted by flames yesterday afternoon and the residence of A. E. Smedley, nearby was practically destroyed. Several other residences in the vicinity caught fire, but the flames were extinguished before serious damage was done.

Early this morning, the barn of J. E. July on Griffiths creek, was discovered in flames, and burned to the ground, with the loss of a prize bull valued at \$500, a pig house and farm machinery.

BRITISH PREMIER ANNOUNCES NAVAL PROGRAM FOR YEAR

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

LONDON, July 23.—Prime-Minister Stanley Baldwin today announced in the House of Commons the British government's naval construction program, including two cruisers to be laid down in October, two next February and three yearly thereafter, making four cruisers to be constructed this fiscal year and three next.

The British government also has decided upon the annual construction of nine destroyers and six submarines, together with certain auxiliary vessels, beginning with the financial year 1925-27, this program to be continued during the normal life of the present parliament, Baldwin announced.

Some of the new cruisers will conform to the existing 10,000 ton type, and the remainder will be smaller and less expensive, of a type approximately 8,000 tons to be designed by the admiralty.

The additional expenses this year, which Prime-Minister Baldwin estimated at \$27,170 pounds (about \$2,600,000) above the present navy estimates would be met by the admiralty by savings under other departments and by funds which are likely to accrue by not spending money appropriated.

SYNDICATE BUYS MEDFORD FRUIT LAND

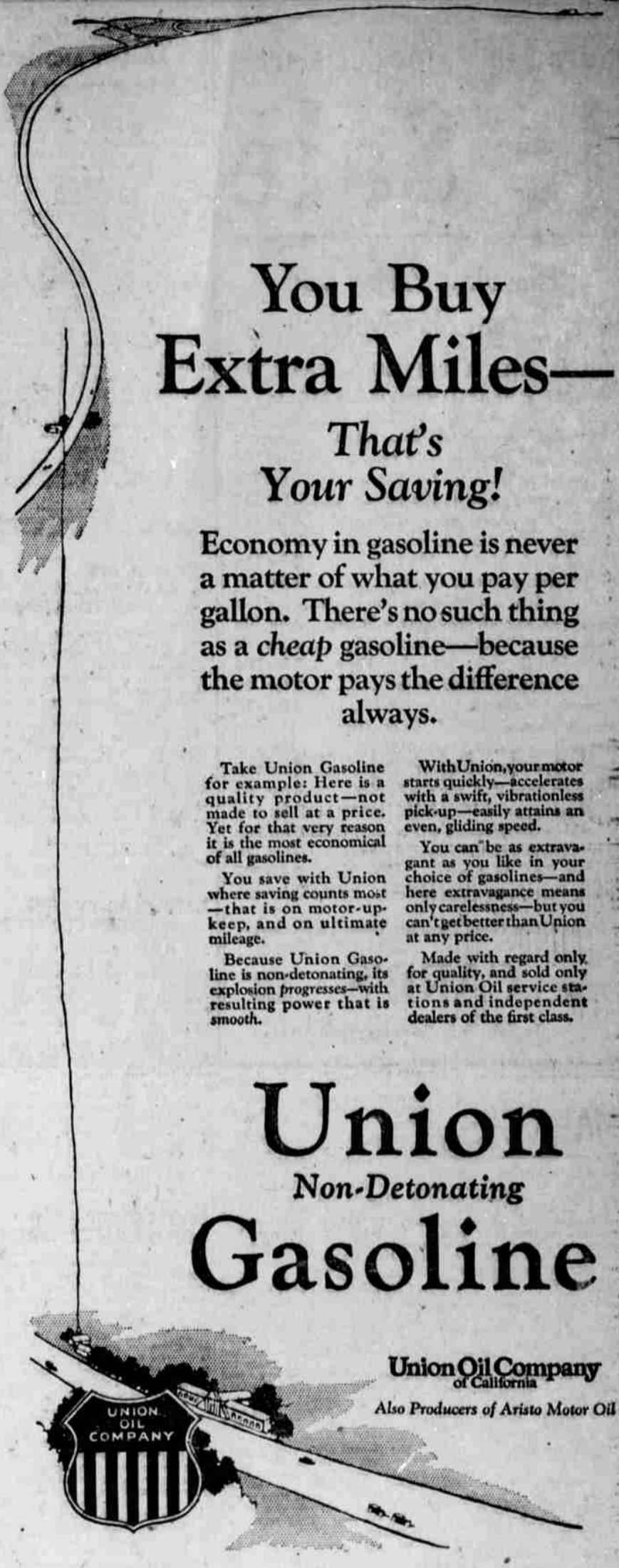
MEDFORD, Ore., July 23.—The largest single purchase of land in Jackson county was recorded late yesterday when 3,280 acres, involving three fruit orchards and four ranches was purchased by a syndicate of Los Angeles men from the Pacific Mutual Insurance company of San Francisco. The purchase price was not announced, but according to a report by the purchasers, the properties are assessed at approximately half a million dollars.

The new owners plan to operate the ranches and orchards, raise stock, and will build a fruit dryer, to handle the pears and apples not sold on the green fruit market.

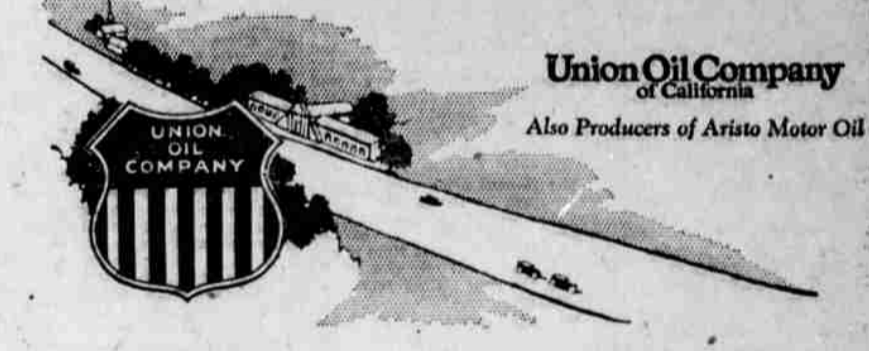
