## EDDY HOPES FOR APPOINTMENT S. OREGON MAN

### Will Withhold Statement on Fish Commission Situation For Present.

### ACTION IS AWAITED

### Selection to Fill Place Held by Commissioner Veatch May Be Satisfactory to Senator.

Senator R. L. Eddy today refused to make any extended statement regarding the fish commission situation other than to say that he still hopes to secure the appointment of a southern Oregon man, one friendly to the Umpqua river interest, in the position of commissioner. In the appointment of J. S. Hays, of Bay City, Governor Pierce, it is claimed failed to keep the word he had given Senator Eddy that a conference would be held before the vacancies on the commission were filled. Senator Eddy is still hopeful, however, that Governor Pierce will appoint a southern Oregon man to take the place of Commissioner Veatch, and until some action is taken in that regard, or until the governor shows a disposition to do nothing more in connection with further appointments, Senator Eddy says he will decline to make any statement.

He says that it has been his desire to see a man friendly to the Umpqua river interests appointed on the commission, and that his efforts have been directed in that line. His entire interest in the fish commission has been with that purpose in view.

There is still one appointment to make. Commissioner Veatch is ready to resign at any time, and Senator Garland was slated to succeed him. The attorney general's ruling, however, that a senator cannot hold a position on the commission does not permit Garland's appointment, so some other man will be chosen for Mr. Veatch's place.

Senator Eddy stated that at the former conference he had acquiesced when the governor agreed to appoint Senator Garland, and that the latter had announced himself as friendly to southern Oregon interests. Mr. Eddy intimated that he is still endeavoring to secure a suitable appointment from southern Oregon to fill Mr. Veatch's place, and that until some definite stand is taken in the matter by

**Double Cross Alleged**  
PORTLAND, July 23.—In appointing Mr. Hays, a fish dealer of Bay City, Oregon, Governor Pierce has, apparently, presented R. L. Eddy, state senator for Douglas county, from naming a man on the commission, according to the governor's agreement with Senator Eddy. Mr. Hays, who was in Portland yesterday, pays the highest tribute to Mr. Hays' qualifications for service on the commission, saying that he is a practical man.

Rather than resign as state senator, Mr. Hays relinquished the position of fish commissioner. He so notified the governor yesterday morning after the governor had told him he could resign either job. It was the expectation of Senator Eddy that when his colleague, Senator Beals, relinquished the fish commission place, that he, Eddy, would have an opportunity to act on the commission a man from the Umpqua district. During the legislature, to secure the support of Mr. Eddy, the governor agreed to permit Eddy and Beals to name two commissioners, with Sam M. Garland as a sort of arbitrator between the two. When the time came Eddy could not get his man sanctioned, so the governor appointed Beals to succeed F. P. Kendall and Garland to succeed John Veatch. This left Senator Eddy out in the cold. Then when the attorney-general ruled that Beals could not be a senator and fish commissioner at the same time, Senator Eddy expected that the old legislative promise would be redeemed.

Senator Eddy had his man picked but Senator Beals and Governor Pierce acted too quickly for him. The resignation of Beals and the appointment of Hays were announced simultaneously, before Senator Eddy could get into action.

To the casual observer it looks as though Governor Pierce has double-crossed Senator Eddy regarding the fish commission, just as he broke his promise to Senator Hays of Washington county that State Game Warden Burghdoff would not be removed.

## KIRK'S RELATIVES THINK TRAGEDY WAS RESULT OF PASSION

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

SAN FRANCISCO, July 23.—The hair trigger hatreds of the old west that flashed and died in but an instant, but that usually eliminated some lurid tragedy for all their brevity, applied the motive in the killing of Henry Kirk in a supposed gun duel near Brawley last Saturday and the suicide of John Truden, Kirk's slayer, in the opinion of members of the Kirk family here.

David Kirk, brother of the dead man is sure that the double tragedy was not the result of six years of differences, as suggested in a letter found on Truden, but was the outcome of quickly-formed and quick-flaming passions that were a throwback to the old frontier days when men "shot it out" on the spur of the moment.

"We never heard of Truden before," other members of the family said. "Henry must have met him in Brawley and they must have quarreled on the spot. Then they decided to each shoot it out or Henry was murdered by Truden and Truden wrote the 'duel' letter and then committed suicide so that the world would not know him as a murderer."

## IMPORTANT CHANGES PENDING AT BAPTIST ANNUAL CONFERENCE

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

ASTORIA, Ore., July 23.—Although the state Baptist convention continues until Saturday it will reach its climax late this afternoon when H. M. Sherwood, principal of the Backman school of Portland, will present recommendations for the revision of the state church constitution, including possible changes in the declaration of faith.

The essential interest of the convention is focused upon this matter which is expected to have strong influence upon the election of officers, scheduled for just before adjournment. Dr. J. Whitcombe Brougher of Los Angeles, former Portland pastor, is attending today. While he has no vote on the floor, he is understood to be exerting a powerful influence in support of the fundamentalist faction.

The program today is devoted to business matters. The convention is to decide future policy with reference to Linfield college and take up the problem of constitutional revision.
