Moonshine's Toll

Moonshine killed 79 people in New York state during May. The figures are given by Dr. Nicoll, state commissioner of health. "Since there is a tendency to disguise the actual cause of death in cases of alcoholism," says Dr. Nicoll, "it is probable that the figure represent but a small portion of the people who died from bad liquor or excessive use of intoxicants."

The Rough Rifflans

France has served notice on Abdel-Krim and his Rifflans unless they come in and surrender, a "great offensive" will be launched against them. Spain has been sending the Rifflans messages of this kind for the past 13 years and Abdel-Krim has been fighting men like "Bres Rabbits" famous for baby, "jes kep on sayin' nothin' and usually saying it with a wallop that jarred. It might be unfair to give these ancient barbarians too much credit for escaping defeat at the hands of decrepit, graft ridden Spain for so many years, but as they have successfully defended their barren country against all comers for about 200 years, they have proved themselves foemen worthy of most any kind of steel that can be used against them.

Prohibition and Narcotics

It frequently is charged, with that looseness of inditement so characteristic of partisan argument, that prohibition has caused a considerable increase in the use of narcotics. This theory is based upon the belief that humanity is prone to error and that, deprived of one vice, men will seek another and perhaps more harmful substitute. It is a theory that for long has been used by those who are given to various excesses, to condone their own failings—but happily, in the instance of prohibition, it has been clearly disproved here in America.

WIFE CLAIMS SHE WAS JUST A SLAVE

MEDFORD, Ore., July 24.—That the low price of cows and other farm products caused his wife to sue for divorce, is the claim of Victor Brown, rancher at Kerby, Josephine county, in a counter-complaint filed in circuit court at Jackson today. Brown claims his wife wants to leave him because he can only make a living on his farm, whereas a few years ago he made a profit. Mrs. Brown denies this and says she wants a divorce because she has been "nothing but a slave to her mother-in-law."

Mexican Labor Question

In Pacific coast territory where much Mexican common labor is employed by fruit growers, farmers, railroads and like industries, strong opposition is voiced to any change in the immigration laws which contemplate extending quota provisions of Immigration Act to citizens of Mexico. It is only from Mexico that such seasonal labor is obtained or may be obtained.

135,000 WOOL WORKERS WALK OUT

BRADFORD, Eng., July 24.—A shut down in the wool textile industry over wage disputes affected 135,000 workers occurred here today. Fires for all fighting occurred at Barkerwood mill, where many girl workers, whose wages have not been reduced since their posts. A crowd of 200 girls from other concerns marched up on the mill and demanded that all workers leave. The doors were stormed and some of the employees inside the building were attacked, but the police stopped hostilities before there were any casualties.
