OREGON BAPTISTS DECLARE UNDYING FAITH IN BIBLE

ASTORIA, Ore., July 24.—Baptists of Oregon, in annual convention here, engaged in revising their constitution, adopted a preamble which declares belief in the virgin birth of Christ, the inspired authority of the scriptures, and in the personal visible return of Christ. The declaration of faith was adopted as a preamble to the constitution after a spirited debate last night. It was presented as the second article of the constitution. The declaration was hailed here as a separate article. To the declaration of faith as presented was added that the Baptist church "constitutes a regeneration of church membership, believing in baptism by immersion."

WILL INVESTIGATE BIG BANK MERGER

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., July 24.—Governor Pierce has asked the federal comptroller of the treasury to institute a thorough investigation of the consolidation whereby the United States National Bank and the Ladd and Tilton Bank of Portland have been merged before approval. The merger it became known here today.

Inquiry on a rumor that the governor had protested the consolidation brought the reply from him that he had simply suggested to the comptroller that an inquiry be made.

The governor declared that he telegraphed the suggestion to Washington after several appeals had been made to him by creditors of the Ladd and Tilton Bank who feared that their claims against the absorbed institution would be jeopardized by the merger.

While refusing to divulge the names of those who had complained to him the governor intimated that they were persons interested in claims against the Ladd & Tilton Bank that are now in litigation and those involved in prospective litigation growing out of the bank's financial operations.

PORTLAND, July 24.—J. C. Alsworth, president of the United States National Bank, said when informed of the action of Governor Pierce that a transfer of the Ladd and Tilton deposits and assets had already been approved by the treasury.

"The comptroller approved it on Saturday, the day the deal was made," he said. Alsworth explained that the deal was not exactly a merger. The Ladd and Tilton Bank retains its entity, but the United States National has bought its deposits and liquid assets, he said.

In other words, the United States National simply took the depositors' accounts of Ladd and Tilton Bank and the cash securities that represented them, he added. The United States National thereby becomes responsible for the payment of this money to the depositors, and Ladd and Tilton is relieved of this responsibility, he explained, but Ladd and Tilton still retains its own identity to liquidate all other claims against it.

MONY STONES CASH SAVINGS WORDS

CALIFORNIA AND OREGON

STATE CAN ONLY COLLECT ON HALF

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., July 24.—The state of Oregon, which sought to collect inheritance tax on the \$1,066,000 estate left by C. J. Bowles, Seattle ship-builder, who

came to Portland in 1918 to build ships, can collect only on half the estate, under a decision today by Circuit Judge Taxwell, of the probate court.

The court held that as Bowles had never legally given up his residence in Seattle, the Washington state law, under which the wife is owner of half of her husband's property, rules, and that the wife holds possession of her half in her own right, and not as an inheritance.

Under the decision the heirs of the other half of the estate must

pay an inheritance tax amounting to approximately \$200,000. The estate consisted of bonds and other valuables which were in a safety deposit box in a Portland bank when Bowles died.

Judge Taxwell held that Bowles maintained his Washington residence by keeping his Seattle church and club connections and refusing to register as a voter here.

Growing Ill-Feeling Lengthens Odds Against Scopes



Growing animosity of Dayton, which is nearly 100 per cent anti-evolution in feeling, is increasing the odds against the defense in the Tennessee evolution trial.
