WAR OFFICERS COMMAND SAME MEN AS VETERANS 27 YEARS LATER.

MONROE, La., July 24.—The distinction is claimed by Monroe Camp, No. 5, United Spanish War Veterans, that it is the only one in the country having for its three principal camp officers the same men who commanded the veterans as a unit in the Spanish-American War.
The officers are Frank P. Stubbs, commander; Eugene J. Courtney, senior vice-commander, and Walter B. Mangum, junior vice-commander. They were captain, first lieutenant and second lieutenant, respectively, of Company H, First Louisiana Infantry, during the Spanish War.

LOADED TRUCK GOES OVER BANK

G. L. Joelson, of Umpqua, had a bad accident at about 8 o'clock Tuesday evening, when his three-ton Republic truck, loaded with 78 lambs, went off the road several miles west of Sutherlin and turned over, says the Sutherlin Sun. Alva Maupin, of Kellogg, was with Mr. Joelson on the truck at the time of the accident, and both men escaped with only minor bruises, seems almost miraculous.
The truck was proceeding from Kellogg to Oakland at the time and when the summit of Marvin Hill had been reached the steering apparatus broke and a second later the big truck went off the grade and down the steep embankment at the side of the road.
Both men jumped before the car turned over but the sheep were carried to the bottom of the embankment where they were dumped out in a jumbled condition, two being killed as a result of the turnover.
The gas caught fire, threatening to destroy the truck, and there being no means at hand to subdue the blaze, Mr. Joelson hastened to the home of Robert Vinson some distance away where grain sacks and buckets were secured and within a short time the blaze was under control, but not until after the entire ignition system had been completely destroyed.

ASHTON, Idaho, July 24.—Yellowstone Park has a vocabulary all its own and tourists visiting it the first time have many surprises in store for them. EXTRADITION GRANT RECALLED BY PIERCE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., July 24.—Grant of extradition which yesterday authorized the return to Los Angeles of Harry Van Gilder to face charges of embezzlement was today recalled by Governor Pierce after information had been received from California authorities that the criminal charge against Van Gilder was an attempt on the part of a Los Angeles brokerage firm to secure, by intimidation settlement of a disputed debt. Shortly after Judge L. H. McMahan on the Marion county circuit court, granted a petition for a writ of habeas corpus and Van Gilder was dismissed a free man.

The charge that Van Gilder's promoters were attempting to press criminal charges for a purely civil dispute was made at the extradition hearing yesterday, but was contradicted by telegraphic advices from Los Angeles authorities addressed to the governor asking that he disregard any such claim. Van Gilder was arrested in Salem several weeks ago by local police while in company with a motor party of three others. His companions were released the day following the arrest. Several Salem men appeared at the hearing yesterday in Van Gilder's behalf concerning his character, among them Asiel Rush, local banker.

LIGHTNING STARTS 16 FOREST FIRES

PORTLAND, July 24.—Sixteen forest fires were started in the Chelan National forest, Washington, in the last 48 hours by lightning. It was reported to the forest service. Twelve emergency patrols were sent out to check them before they became serious.
A fire which burned over about 600 acres on Fall creek No. 1 in Shikyou national forest is now under control. The Wind River Lumber company has been directed by the forest service to put twenty more men on the Wind River fire-fighting force in order to place the fire completely under control before dry weather comes again.
The cool, damp weather is greatly aiding crews in getting fires under control.
