INAUGURATION OF ENFORCEMENT PLAN DELAYED SHORT TIME

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, July 25.—Inauguration of the new prohibition enforcement plan not only has been postponed but several important changes have been made in the proposed re-organization of the country for enforcement purposes. Evidence that the re-organization had been sidetracked only temporarily however, was furnished today by a letter sent by Assistant Secretary Andrews of the treasury, notifying all field officers of the prohibition unit that the present appointment of unclassified service employees will be terminated not later than October 15. That will end their jobs unless they are reappointed. The date of September one has tentatively been fixed for making the new arrangement effective, but a further delay is possible. The boundaries of the new districts as originally announced have been the subject of considerable criticism from various quarters. But Mr. Andrews insisted today that the changes decided on were dictated solely by a desire for efficiency, and had nothing to do with politics. Under the revision, South Dakota, previously joined with Minnesota and North Dakota, now is a part of the Nebraska-Iowa district, with headquarters in Omaha. Kansas, previously in the same district with Nebraska and Iowa, will be linked instead with Missouri and the southern counties of the Eastern judicial district of Illinois, with headquarters at St. Louis. Acting Secretary Winston of the treasury said today the re-organization would be put into effect simultaneously throughout the country, "about September 1."

"The selection of the 24 administrators," he continued, "is a matter of the gravest importance. The department is giving all recommendations earnest consideration and is making a thorough survey of the field with a view of the selection of the best available material." The changes in district lines, he declared, had been made "upon the recommendation of Commissioner Blair who was absent through illness when the districts were first determined."

The letter sent by Mr. Andrews to the field agents, informed them that some of those now in the service would be retained and "even promoted in the new organization," but that selections would be based on "merit only."

He added that the regional administrators would have a free hand in selecting personnel.

A. RURIC TODD IS STARTING BOOM FOR SEATTLE MAYORSHIP

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) KELSEO, Wash., July 25.—Printed posters signed "A. Ruric Todd next mayor of Seattle," this morning announced to the citizens of Kelseo and Longview that the former Kelseo mayor and present claimant to the office will speak on the street tonight in Lone View. Todd's topic, says the poster, will be the Port of Kelseo. The poster reads: "Saturday, July 25, 8 p. m. free. Second broadfire. Timber dollars are not necessarily wood's money. Hotpocg broadcasting at Broadway and Commerce. Longview Subject: Separate thine own territory from the Port of Kelseo. Oh Longview, and build the vision port for there are many shovels in the pockets of the founder. Speaker, A. Ruric Todd, himself, next mayor of Seattle. Come early, 5,000 people expected. 'Life is a strange problem and few get out of it—alive.' A. Ruric Todd." Numerous reports have been heard that Todd aspires to be governor of the state of Washington. This is the first intimation that he hopes to be mayor of Seattle. Where to locate Port of Kelseo wharfs and improvements is the main topic of conversation in Kelseo and Longview these days and interest is heightening as the date of the election, August 1, approaches. At that election the voters will decide whether the development should be located at the Oregon Way site on the Columbia river, near Longview, recommended by A. R. Roberts, or at the Carrollton channel site at the mouth of the Cowlitz river, which seems to be most favored in Kelseo. Todd is an engineer brought here by the state and the chamber of commerce a year and a half ago to make a survey and recommendations for the port.

PROHI DIRECTOR IS INDICTED TODAY

CHICAGO, July 25.—Major Percy Owen, Illinois prohibition director; Ralph Stone, former state director, and seven others, were indicted today by the federal grand jury on charges of conspiracy to violate prohibition laws. A special inquiry into sacramental wine permits and withdrawal in Illinois, which began in March 1924, led to today's indictments. Grafts and bribes in excess of \$500,000 for the improper use of sacramental wines were charged before the grand jury. Twelve prohibition agents including three state directors have been indicted in Illinois in connection with this and similar investigations launched by special agents from Washington.

The investigators now are gathering evidence on beer runners and industrial alcohol leaks in the territory for presentation to an early session of the grand jury. Owen was named in two counts, charging conspiracy to extort, and

GOVT. REGULATION OF LIQUOR FAILURE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALEM, Ore., July 25.—Government regulation of liquor in British Columbia is not satisfactory to the citizens there in the opinion of William S. Levens, Oregon state prohibition commissioner, today returned from a convention of Northwest Association of Sheriffs and Police at Victoria. "The same growing pains are being experienced there that Oregon experienced in state prohibition days," said Levens. "In those days, it will be recalled, each individual was allowed to import so much liquor per month, and this was abused because some persons who didn't drink would allow drinking friends to use their names to ship in more liquor by express than they were entitled to. The dry Canadian provinces are having their troubles just as Oregon had them and in the wet provinces the liquor stores are not giving satisfaction. "I am more of the opinion, since attending the convention, that the liquor law should be regulated. It must be a late prohibition or the old absolutely wet system. The United States has the right system and we are going to win, for public sentiment is growing in our favor."

to violate the prohibition law. A statement by William Goldstein, attorney for Owen, said that he is "innocent of the charges in this indictment," and that "at the proper time and place he is certain he will establish his innocence."

The attorneys charged the indictments were based upon the uncorroborated testimony of "criminals and bootleggers," and that Major Owen was denied the requested privilege of appearing before the grand jury to submit to questioning.

Leo Klein, assistant district attorney in charge of the investigation, said Owen, Bennett and Bumps were parties to a conspiracy to add the illegal withdrawal of 500,000 gallons of sacramental wine, through which they sought to extort \$200,000. Stone is charged with having collected upwards of \$30,000 in cash, most of which was turned over to Owen.

Sacramental wine withdrawn aggregating more than \$15,000,000 in 1921, started the intelligence unit in a quest of graft, bribes and corruption.

MORE CLUES IN MYSTERIOUS KILLING OF TWO MEN

BRAWLEY, Cal., July 25.—Search for a third body in a marsh near Jacumba, checking of the movements of a prominent business woman of the town of Imperia, is believed to have known both men when they lived in Maryland, and the revelation that Henry Kirk had been an expert pistol shot and an instructor at the naval academy at Annapolis, were today's high lights in the investigation of the deaths of Kirk and John Truden, which occurred about a week ago. Truden's body was found last Monday, a pistol bullet through the temple, and a note in the pocket indicating that he had killed Kirk in a duel the previous Saturday, committing suicide himself later. The note said there had been blood between the two for six years.

David Kirk, brother of one of the dead men, and his father, arrived here last night from San Francisco. With their coming the first direct light was thrown on the death mystery which has baffled Imperial valley authorities for nearly a week.

A slip of paper was located in Henry Kirk's handbag, and written on it were the words "John Truden, Camp Holabird, Maryland." Both of the dead men were in the military service during the war. Henry Kirk was stationed at Camp Mead, Maryland, his brother said.

Kirk's father and brother declared that Henry was an expert shot with pistol and that he had been a pistol instructor at the naval academy at one time. Both expressed the belief that Henry Kirk had been murdered and David Kirk said: "We will investigate this cruel murder until the true facts of the case are revealed."

TO ERECT BIG MILLS

BREMERTON, Wash., July 25.—Two of the largest and most modern sawmills in the country will be erected at Port Gamble and Port Ludlow, it was announced yesterday by Edward G. Ames, vice-president of the Puget Mill Company. The new mills will rival those of the Long-Bell and Weyerhaeuser mills at Longview, Wash., Ames said. The McCormick Steamship company of California has been given a renewed option on the Puget Mill Company's properties on condition that they construct two new mills at the two ports. If the renewed option is not exercised the Puget Mill company will carry out the construction plans, Ames declared.

NEW INDICTMENTS ANTI-TRUST CASE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, July 25.—New indictments against 155 corporations and individuals in the furniture cases in which the government charges violations of the Sherman anti-trust act, were returned today in federal district court.

The addition of many individuals connected with the associations of furniture manufacturers and the indictment of many corporations would permit imposition of jail sentences upon conviction of the individuals as well as assessment of fines of the companies, it was explained by Roger Shale, special assistant to the United States attorney-general.

The corporations named in the new indictments were those manufacturing dining room and bed room furniture who were named in the original indictments, returned several weeks ago and failed to appear and enter pleas of guilty.

Mr. Shale said that approximately one-half of the members of the National Alliance of Furniture Manufacturers have already entered pleas of guilty and stand firm in excess of \$200,000. For the other cases he promised every effort would be made to bring them to an early trial.

MCCORMICK LUMBER CO. BUYS BIG HOLDINGS

SAN FRANCISCO, July 25.—The Charles R. McCormick Lumber Company of San Francisco, a Delaware corporation, today announced the purchase for approximately \$20,000,000 of the timber holdings, sawmills and other property of Pope and Talbot, located in the state of Washington. The deal is said to be one of the largest transactions involving manufacturing plants and timber negotiated on the Pacific coast.

The McCormick company has operated two saw mills at St. Helens, Ore., for several years, but the new holdings will add approximately 80,000 acres to the company's properties, with timber comprising approximately 3,000,000 feet. In addition the properties will include two large saw mills on Puget sound, one at Port Gamble and the other at Port Ludlow, with cargo shipping facilities, hotels, logging railroads and other properties.

Through the deal the Pope & Talbot interests will become large stockholders in the Charles R. McCormick Lumber company, with adequate representation on the board of directors.

The purchase will necessitate the building of a new saw mill plant at Port Gamble, involving the expenditure of approximately \$1,500,000. The holdings of the McCormick interests are not included in the transaction, the McCormick Steamship company of San Francisco and the Charles R. McCormick Lumber company of Portland, Ore.
