ENGINEERS' SKILL CONQUERS TURBULENT ARKANSAS RIVER.

PUEBLO, Colo., July 27.—Man's battle has been won against the turbulent Arkansas river which in June, 1921, overflowed its banks in an angry flood, wrecking \$29,000,000 damage on the surrounding countryside and taking a hundred lives.

The river has been turned recently from its old natural channel into a man-made passageway, lined with concrete levees, and now, according to engineers, there will be no recurrence of the devastating flood disaster. The flood protection project was not scheduled for completion until 1926, but through favorable weather conditions during the winter the major portions of the project were finished recently.

A difficult engineering problem was encountered in the construction of the new channel and building of the levees. The new channel passed through the yards of a Denver, Rio Grande Western railroad and in order to carry out the project it was necessary to move the railroad yards during the process of construction of the new channel. This was done without interruption to the railroad service.

Of the \$4,000,000 expended on the flood protection project, \$1,000,000 was utilized in the construction of the channel through the railroad yards.

The flood protection work, engineers said, required the moving of 1,100,000 cubic yards of dirt and construction of 24 miles of railroad track and seven bridges and viaducts.

A concrete retention dam was built across the river seven miles north of Pueblo. The dam will store 21,000 acre feet of water, which can be utilized in local irrigation projects.

JAPAN PLANS HIGHER RATE OF INTEREST ON POSTAL SAVINGS.

TOKYO, July 27.—The Communications Department reports the aggregate of postal savings in Japan at the end of May amounted to 1,127,822,384 yen and the number of depositors were given as 20,467,510. Compared with the preceding month the total deposits showed a decrease of 2,168,474 yen, but the depositors increased by 184,922.

At present four percent interest is paid, but the Communications Department is consulting with the Finance Ministry with a view of preventing a further decrease in savings.

IRELAND IS CHECKING TUBERCULOSIS

DUBLIN, July 27.—(A. P.)—Tuberculosis in the Free State is gradually lessening, statistics show. In 1919 one in about every 70 of the population was affected by some form of the disease while in 1923 the proportion had diminished to

about one in every 90. The decrease in deaths from all forms of tuberculosis in five years was 1371. In 1923 the tuberculosis death rate was 1.41 per 1,000.

NOTARIES PUBLIC IN OREGON: OTHER ITEMS OF INTEREST

During the month of June, 1925, the notarial-law book division of the office of Secretary of State Sam A. Koser, issued a total of 37 official commissions and the number of qualified notaries public under commission in the State of Oregon to July 15, 1925, was 5,131. The total fees collected by this division during June, was \$1,622.05, of which \$485 was for notarial commissions; \$185 for filing certificates of migratory chattel mortgages; \$933.55 for law book sales, and \$107.95 for filing of warrants of arrest, certificates of character, etc.

Included in the June volume of filings in this division were 379 certificates of migratory chattel mortgages, 201 certificates of satisfaction of migratory chattel mortgages; 19 certificates of assignment of migratory chattel mortgages; 87 notarial and 15 miscellaneous commissions and 15 pardons, privileges, warrants of arrest, proclamations, etc. Two hundred copies of volume III of the Oregon reports were received from the publishers and 164 copies were distributed to judges of the courts, district attorneys and other officials; 147 copies of the Oregon report, 128 copies of the 1925 session laws and 26 copies of miscellaneous session laws were sold during the month.

CORPUS CHRISTI PROCESSION BEING HELD IN 400 YEARS

BERLIN, July 27.—For the first time in 400 years, Corpus Christi Day was celebrated recently at the German capital by a public procession. This is taken as evidence of the republican regime as compared with the old monarchical. Under the monarchy, the official state religion of Prussia was Protestant, and the king was at the same time titular head of the church. Catholic processions such as are customary in Bavaria, for instance, on Corpus Christi Day were forbidden.

St. Hedwig's Roman Catholic church early on Corpus Christi day opened its doors to the accompaniment of trombones to let out a procession of men, women, and children, followed by monks and priests in ecclesiastical robes, and men and finally by the archbishop in a canopy. As first steps he invoked God's blessing on the people for the world's salvation from disease and misery, war and hunger.

IRISH FREE STATE TO HOLD FIRST SENATORIAL ELECTION

DUBLIN, July 27.—(A. P.)—The first elections to the Free State Senate, heretofore an entirely nominated body, will take place this autumn. Because of the complicated system of election it is expected to take three months to determine the results. Of the 60 members, 15 are to be elected by plebiscite to four who have been filling vacancies.

The mode of election provides for a panel containing three times as many names as there are seats to be filled. The senate nominates one-third of this panel and the Ball Box-third. In addition, candidates may appear on this panel without nomination, so that for the 49 seats the panel will contain 76 names.

The constituency is the whole of the Free State, and votes are limited to persons over thirty years of age. The voting is by proportional representation, and the distribution of preferences among 76 names will take many weeks to reveal. The senate has no power, the minimum of which is to hold up for 270 days any bill except a money bill, passed by the Dail.

INVENTOR HOPES NEW MUSICAL INSTRUMENT WILL REPLACE PIANO

MOSCOW, July 27.—(A. P.)—A Russian musician, S. Gilev, has invented a new musical instrument which he hopes will replace the piano and organ. The instrument, which has an ordinary keyboard, is in the form of a box one yard wide and weighing only eight pounds. The usual strings are replaced by a steel comb, and the little hammers by tiny pickers which tinkle upon the teeth of the comb.

Russian composers and musicians, including Igor Stravinsky and Alexander Scriabin, have played the instrument at the Moscow Conservatory of Music, testify that it is capable of replacing existing piano and that it has a stronger, more and superior intonation than the ordinary piano. The new instrument has been christened "Picholov" and it is believed it can be produced at a few-ninth price by contract with the present bulky old-fashioned piano.

WALTER LEAGUE TO MOVE FOR STRONGER FAMILY TIES

SAN FRANCISCO, July 27.—(A. P.)—The thirty-third international convention of the Walter League, an association of young people's societies of the Synodical Conference of the Lutheran church, opened today in the civic auditorium, with an address by A. A. Grossmann, president. These conventions usually are attended by from 2,000 to 4,000 persons.

The Rev. Paul G. Prokop, executive secretary, and Prof. John H. C. Fritz, dean of Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, were other speakers at the opening session.

The Walter League has for its chief purpose keeping the young people with the church and rendering services to the church. It comprises a senior society membership of 1,750 societies and a junior membership of 275 societies. It was organized 22 years ago and today is the most conservative youth movement of the fundamentalist school, asserted the Rev. Mr. Prokop.

The league is supporting 11 missionaries and native mission workers in China and India. An important effort to be presented to the convention will be the "Back to the Church" movement to re-establish the family ties and re-establish the family ties and re-establish the family ties.
