## NORRIS CLAIMS REACTIONARIES PACKING GOVT.

### Says Commission Jammed With Men Blocking Fight Against Trusts.

### BLAMES HARDING

### Declares Coolidge Administration Is Carrying on Policy Started by Predecessor.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
WASHINGTON, July 27.—A charge that the Harding administration inaugurated and the Coolidge administration has pursued a system of "packing" the various government commissions with reactionaries, was made by Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, in a formal statement made public last night.

"It is not only the federal trade commission, but also the tariff commission and the Interstate Commerce commission," Senator Norris said, "to which such appointments have been made."

Referring then to the appointment of William E. Humphrey to the federal trade commission, the Nebraska senator said that what should be done is "to advocate and if possible carry out the repeal of the law providing for the federal trade commission."

"Everybody knows," the senator added, "that the majority of the federal trade commission, honest though they may be personally and individually, is so imbued with reactionary sentiment and so partisan in their makeup, that they would not see a wrong committed by a big trust or a monopoly, even though it did appear as 'huge as high Olympus.'"

"So what is the use of having a federal trade commission? If we are going to let the big fellows eat the little ones up, why not let them do it directly without burdening the taxpayers with the expense of a commission?"

LONDON, July 27.—A Reuters Canton dispatch says a Russian, General Borodin, has been appointed advisor to the Canton government, succeeding Robert S. Norman, an American. (Mr. Norman is from Oakland, Cal., and was legal adviser to the late Dr. Sun Yat-Sen, head of the Canton government.)

The dispatch says the supreme command of the Canton government has been placed in the hands of Russians. Whether "whites" or "reds" is not specified.

Sells Big Ranch.—A. T. ("Andy") Bestal, well known former timber cruiser and operator in Roseburg about 15 years ago, has just sold his 240-acre ranch on the Coquille river, Coos county, for the reported price of \$72,000. The buyers are from Alberta, Canada.

### DISCOVER NINE FIRES.

PORTLAND, July 27.—Nine fires, three of which were apparently incendiary and the others started by berry pickers, were discovered in Columbia county yesterday. It was reported to the Oregon Fire Relief association. All but one were under control last night. The other was expected to be under control today. It burned over about 100 acres of grove timber.

### NINE HURT IN WRECK.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., July 27.—Nine persons were severely bruised and shocked when a Pennsylvania bridge train due here at 3:06 p. m. was derailed just inside the city limits soon after crossing the drawbridge at Thorncastle. Nine coaches of the twelve coach train were derailed.

NEW YORK, July 27.—A number of passengers were injured when a Pennsylvania train was derailed at Absecon, N. J., this afternoon, according to a report to the rail road headquarters here.

A dozen injured have been sent to the Atlantic City hospital. None are believed to have been seriously hurt.

James A. Flaherty, supreme Knight of the Knights of Columbus, Atlantic City, who had just returned today from Ireland, was injured.

The cause of the derailment is believed due to a defect in one of the wheels of the rear chair cars, which left the track first. Only the engine and the first three coaches were left on the track.

## REEDSPORT MEN ASKING MONEY FOR ROAD WORK

### County Must Raise \$100,000 to Build Highway to County Line.

### STATE IS READY

### Delegation Says Commission Will Complete Work if County Will Meet Its Share.

Warren Reed, Jerry Startup and C. McC. Johnson, of Reedsport, were in Roseburg today meeting with the county court in an effort to secure the completion of the Roosevelt highway between Reedsport and the Coos county line. These three men have been representing the citizens of Reedsport and the west end of the county in an effort to have the Roosevelt road finished. They met with the state highway commission, with the result that they have secured an offer whereby the state agrees to finish the road between the points named of the county will pay the sum of \$100,000.

The cost of the road between Reedsport and the Coos county line is estimated at \$250,000 to \$275,000. The state and government are cooperating in the construction of this road, with the counties paying a proportionate share.

Douglas County must pay \$100,000 for its part of the road between Reedsport and the county line. The commission will allow two years in which to pay the sum, Mr. Reed states.

## ORIGIN OF PLOT TO KIDNAP MARY TOLD IN COURT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
LOS ANGELES, July 27.—The prosecution's first witness, M. T. Harney, cafe man, took the stand here today in the trial of three men accused of plotting to kidnap Mary Pickford, film star, with a recital of the purported origin of the plot back in May, 1922.

Harney, who said he had been a room mate of C. Z. Stephens, one of the accused trio, recounted conversations between the two which sought to alight on a means to "pick up some easy money."

He said they discussed kidnaping Pola Negri, film star, but abandoned the idea because they believed she did not have enough ransom money available to make it worth while.

He told how a plan to kidnap Jackie Coogan, juvenile film actor, was dropped because Coogan was a court ward.

The Pickford plot, he swore, was thrust-out in 1922 and its discussion resumed in March of this year.

Defense attorneys objected to this entire line of testimony because it referred to only one of the accused, and the court ruled that it would be stricken out if the prosecution later did not make good its promise to connect the other accused, Adrian Wood and Claude Holcomb with Harney's testimony.

## LOSS FROM FOREST FIRES FOR LAST YEAR \$38,000,000

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 27.—Forest fires swept 29,000,000 acres of public and private lands last year, with a monetary damage of \$38,000,000, it is estimated by the forest service.

The number of forest fires was fixed at 92,000, which was 24,000 more than in 1923 and 45,000 more than the nine-year average. Incendiary fires topped the list, with 21,000. Brush burning came next with 16,000 and smokers trailed with 13,000. Other chief causes were attributed to railroads, camp fires, lumbering and lightning.

Money damage in 1924 was estimated at \$46,000,000 more than in 1923 and \$18,000,000 higher than the nine-year average. The estimate does not include damage to young plant growth, watershed protection, wild life or recreational areas.

On the national forest areas alone 8247 fires were reported as sweeping 602,000 acres with a money loss of \$1,500,000.

William B. Greeley, chief of the forest service, declared the increase in reported fires was due partly to more complete reports, although he termed 1924 as a "very bad year."

"The greatest single agency with which to combat forest fires is public opinion," he said. "The federal and state governments are doing their utmost with the funds and equipment allotted them. It is high time that a more effective weapon is placed at their disposal and that weapon is an outraged opinion."
