SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 28.—Consummation of the European security pact, in the opinion of President Coolidge, would lay a foundation for further disarmament.

Published reports that the president had given up hope for another disarmament conference were denied today at the summer White House, although it was pointed out that conditions in Europe are not yet propitious for initiating a conference.

PRESIDENT FAVORS CO-OPERATIVE BILL FOR THE FARMERS

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 28.—A discussion of the agricultural situation between President Coolidge and congressional leaders, who are visiting White Court for conferences, has revealed a general agreement that legislation in the next congress should be limited to enactment of a cooperative marketing bill.

President Coolidge favors passage of a cooperative marketing measure, although he is of the opinion, it would be best for congress to work out the details.

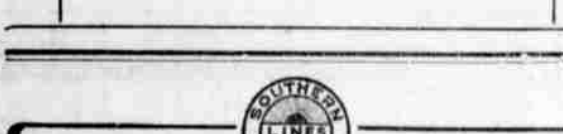
