CALIFORNIA DREAM CASTLE OF BARONESS IS NOW DESERTED.

PASADENA, Cal., July 29.—Except for the haunting footsteps of an aged caretaker, Castle Rosemond, the dream of Baroness von Zimmerman, stands silent and deserted in the quiet of the hills near here.

The baroness and her husband came to America nearly 14 years ago. A dream which she had been harboring for a long time became a reality in 1917 with the completion of Castle Rosemond, which with its 40 rooms and huge baronial hall is said to have cost \$1,000,000. Baroness von Zimmerman died April 26, 1917, and shortly after the United States entered the World War, the property was seized by and still is in the hands of the alien property custodian.

Baroness von Zimmerman was born March 12, 1860, in Gnadensfels, Germany, the daughter of a wealthy brewer. She married Baron von Zimmerman, manufacturer of porcelain, when a young woman. Later her father died leaving her a vast estate and an annual income from Russian rail-

road securities, which became worthless when the czarist government of Russia was overthrown.

A large portion of her estate, valued at \$3,000,000, was bequeathed to three sisters then living in Germany. To an adopted daughter, little Beatrice Denton, eight, nothing was left. A legal battle followed and a short time later the court awarded her \$10,000.

DENTISTS SEEK RECOGNITION

VIENNA, July 29.—The recent International Congress of Dentists adopted a resolution asking authorities for official recognition of the professional designation of "dentist." The resolution also urged all countries to give international legal recognition to one dentist, so that a dentist of one country would have full legal rights to practice in any other country.

Other provisions sought legal regulation of dental courses, training, governmental guarantee of training, and the extension of social benefit insurance to dentists.

TOKYO, July 29.—The Ginza Merchants League has inaugurated a movement for improving and beautifying Ginza street, the Broadway of Japan's Capital.

It is planned to place the reconstruction work in the hands of an American contractor, the cost of the improvements being estimated at 60,000,000 yen. This sum it is hoped to raise by a loan in the United States under a government guarantee, with redemption provided for in 20 years.

FORMER CHORUS GIRL NOW TITLED ENGLISH PEERESS

NEW YORK, July 29.—A former chorus girl, a blonde, who married an American millionaire, thus legitimizing their three children, but who never held a place in American social circles, has become a British peeress.

Mrs. Guinevere Sinclair Gould, widow of George J. Gould, was married yesterday in Montreal to George V. John Broderick, Viscount Dunstond, son and heir of the Earl of Middleton. The family title dates back to 1715. He is 37 years old. The viscountess is several years younger. It is also the viscount's second marriage.

No announcement had been made of the engagement, which slipped off from New York to Montreal to be married, they said, because it was a quiet place. Lady Dunstond's wedding gown was a Parisian creation of green crepe de chine with a lace back and lace collar fastened in front by a diamond arrow pin.

Driving from the church to the Ritz Carlton hotel in a taxi, she wore a green coat trimmed with red fox fur. A Panama hat partly obscured her blonde bobbed hair.

She called her husband "George." He addressed her as "Dear."

"We want to keep our marriage as quiet as possible," Lord Dunstond said. "We shall go touring in Canada and possibly on the continent. We shall of course end up in England where we shall live."

New York society is speculating whether Lady Dunstond's reception in London society will be more cordial than was that in New York three years ago.

Lady Dunstond is the daughter of Alexander Sinclair, a British officer. Her grandfather was Provost of Trinity College, Dublin. She was appearing in the English musical comedy, "The Girl on the Film" in 1914, when she caught the attention of Howard Gould, brother of George J. Gould. When the comedy company came to New York the same year Miss Sinclair carried a letter of introduction from Howard to George, husband of the late Edith Kingdon Gould.

When the company returned to England she remained behind and as Mrs. Sinclair lived in a mansion just off Riverside Drive. Later she moved to Rock. New York children were born to her in 1915, 1916 and 1922. She married George

MALMOE, Sweden, July 29.—A daily airmail service has been established between Malmo and Copenhagen, Berlin, Amsterdam, Paris and London.

UNKNOWN SUICIDE MAY BE BROTHER OF RUSSELL SCOTT

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

CHICAGO, July 29.—Scant belief is held by the police that an unidentified man who shot and killed himself in a Reading, Pennsylvania, hotel yesterday is Robert Scott, brother of Russell Scott, under sentence of death for killing a drug clerk in a holdup. Robert has been sought since the killing, which Russell says his brother did.

The description of the suicide, who cut all labels from his clothing and left a note, "I am nobody from nowhere," tallies only slightly with the missing Scott.

Since Russell's two escapes from the gallows a few hours before the time set for his hanging attracted national attention, Robert has been reported found in various parts of the country.

Meanwhile alienists continue to examine Russell in the county jail. Pending a sanity hearing Monday, the state determined to send him to the gallows, and the defense determined to save him, will each submit testimony of specialists.

Scott's mother and his wife, with the aid of Detroit club women, have rented a store room there and have arranged to raise funds for his defense.

TESTS MADE TO ELIMINATE SUGAR RAFFINATE IN SUGAR MANUFACTURE

HAYANA, July 29.—Manufacture of standard granulated sugar direct from cane juice has been proved a commercial possibility, tests at Central Jersey, near Havana, indicate.

Milton S. Hershey, American chocolate manufacturer and owner of four sugar mills in Cuba, observed that his cane has been carrying on experiments seeking a system workable on a commercial scale which would eliminate the raw sugar stage of refining the cane juice.

Last year a well known chemist and sugar expert carried on a series of experiments which, of itself, would have proved beyond doubt that direct manufacture of white sugar on a large scale could be accomplished at a cost which would compete with the present system.

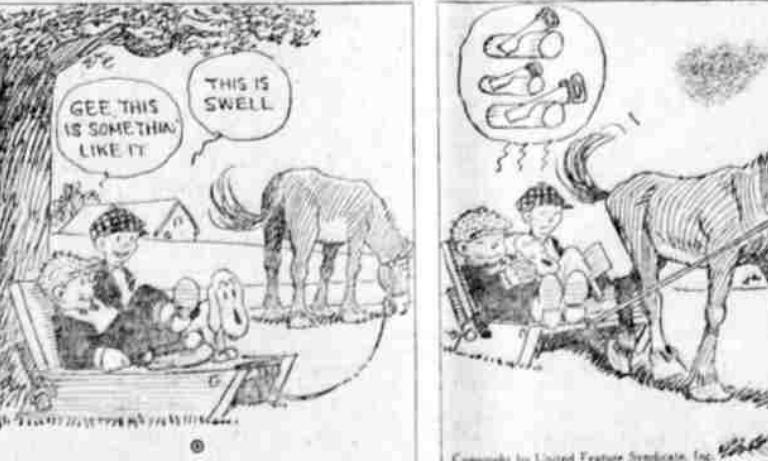
