SPIRITUALIST IS FREED BY COURT

GREENFIELD, Mass., July 29.—Chief Rhamount, Indian spiritualistic medium, arrested several weeks ago on a warrant charging assault on a fellow medium in the midst of a seance, was freed today in district court, when the complainant, Convers Nickerson, failed to appear.

The warrant sworn out four years ago, charged that Rhamount struck Nickerson on the head with a guitar when the latter entered a room in which the Indian medium was conducting a seance at the Lake Pleasant spiritualistic colony near here. It was said that Nickerson had thrown a flashlight on Rhamount, spilling the seance. Nickerson is at present on the Pacific coast.

WOMAN TOURIST PULLS DROWNING MAN FROM RIVER

Woman in Rowboat at Winston Goes Into Water Fully Clothed and Saves Floyd Hoelt.

Floyd Hoelt, a brother of Wm. Hoelt of the Roseburg Garage, had a narrow escape from death by drowning yesterday evening while swimming at Winston. He was in deep water when he experienced a sudden weakness and, after floundering a moment went under without an outcry. His wife, however, who was wading near the shore, saw his plight, and called for help. There were several members of the family on the shore and they immediately went into the water, but they were considerable distance away from the spot where the young man went down.

A man and a woman were rowing a boat near the scene, and were only a few feet from where Hoelt disappeared. Without hesitation the woman, fully clothed, plunged into the water, and caught the unconscious man by the shoulder strap of his bathing suit, as he was sinking in deep water. She held him and swam towards the shore, until help reached her.

Hoelt was taken to a level spot on the bank, and after several minutes of working over him, was restored to consciousness. It is the worse for the accident.

The brave woman who effected his rescue declined to give her name even to the members of the family of the man whose life she undoubtedly saved. As a true heroine she shrank from the thought of reward and publicity, and declined to make her name known. She and her husband are from California, and are on their way by auto enjoying a tour.

AUTO BODY AND HOOD OFFICERS IN AGREEMENT

President of Oregon Motor Association Says He Is Opposed to Traps.

WANTS ENFORCEMENT Association Against Drunken Drivers—Favors Enforcement in Open Highway Patrol.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

HOOD RIVER, Ore., July 29.—An Amicable understanding has been reached between local officers and the Oregon State Motor Association upon the question of enforcing rules of the road in this county. A conference was held yesterday at which motor association officials and county officers considered complaints made by American Automobile association tourists from outside the state.

Joseph E. Dunne, president of the Oregon State Motor association, speaking at the conference said: "The Oregon State Motor association was organized to secure law enforcement. It is unalterably opposed to speed traps. No speed trap evidence is admitted in courts of California.

"We are after the driver who dodges through traffic and doesn't keep his side of the road. We are not seeking that man who, though he may exceed the legal limit somewhat, drives his car on his side of the road on straightaways.

"You cannot get too harsh for us with the drunken driver. He is a menace to the road. Our organization secured a law at the recent legislative session for handling him.

"We wish to see the man who doesn't know how to drive, who goes too slowly and holds up traffic, censured.

"An ideal traffic officer is one who, in full uniform, parades up and down the highways, in plain sight. He is worth more to you than 1,000 officers who hide by the roadside in the bushes. The traffic officer who is of the greatest worth to you is that one who has the least arrests. And the ideal traffic officer is that one who knows how not to fly into a tantrum when dealing with traffic."

At this point in Dunne's address District Attorney Baker interrupted with the statement that he Hood River county officials as to traffic collected exactly. After some discussion an agreement was reached.

WATCH OUR WINDOW FOR BARGAINS

NO CAR SHORTAGE IN WEST EXPRESS OFFICIALS STATE

NEW YORK, July 29.—There is little danger of a car shortage on the Pacific Coast or in the Northwest this coming season if receivers will move their cars promptly, according to H. Giddings, vice-president and general manager of the Pacific Fruit Express, who spent part of the week here visiting the P. F. E.'s local office. Mr. Giddings' headquarters are at San Francisco. He was accompanied by J. B. Crawford, assistant general manager; C. F. Carner, traffic manager, both of Chicago, and K. V. Plummer, of San Francisco.

These gentlemen have just returned from the West, where they have been studying crop conditions with a view to ascertaining as closely as possible what the car requirements for this season will be. With large crops and a heavy movement in sight, which requires that cars be on hand when needed, it is obviously necessary that the Pacific Fruit Express, which handles the bulk of the fruit from the Pacific Coast and the Northwest, be thoroughly posted on what is expected and be prepared to meet the requirements.

Naturally, Mr. Giddings could not definitely say that there would be no car shortage. He did not think there was any danger of one, but it will require the hearty co-operation of the receivers to prevent it. Getting down to concrete figures, Mr. Giddings said that the Pacific Fruit Express has 33,000 of its own cars and has arranged with other car lines for additional cars, giving it a plentiful supply during the heavy months and shipments, September, October and November.
