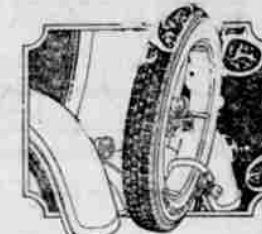

GOVERNMENT MAPS EARTH FAULTS IN ROCKY MOUNTAINS

DENVER, Colo., July 31.—Numerous dead faults, created ages ago by earth movements, probably when the Rocky mountains were being upraised, and which might cause earthquakes at some future time, have been located and charted by government geologists and others between Denver and Longmont and Boulder, Colo., and in the vicinity of Golden, Colorado. United States Geological Survey publications showing the geology of the Denver basin delineate the dead faults. Many geologists believe such faults in California to be the cause of the recent disastrous Santa Barbara quake. C. T. Lupton, a consulting geologist of Denver, says there is a well-defined zone of dead faults at least one-quarter of a mile wide and ten to fifteen miles long, between Denver and Longmont. This zone containing a series of faults crosses North Boulder creek about one mile east of the old post-office of White Rock, in Boulder county, or four miles east of the town of Erie. It runs southeasterly to a point about midway between Louisville and El Mar. Outcroppings of a massive rock, and formations revealed by some of the Northern Colorado coal mines have enabled geologists and students of the subject to locate and chart these faults, declares Mr. Lupton. There has been discovered no evidence of movement in these faults for centuries, it is stated. Two or three dead faults have been located north of North Table mountains, near Golden, also, but evidently these have been inactive for ages, too. Formations on one side of the fault north of Denver have been found to be from 500 to 1,000 feet deeper than on the other side, due to the sharp slip or fault in the earth's surface. Certain evidences of foldings in the earth's surface have been discovered in southeastern Colorado, and near Haswell, just west of Eads, in Kiowa county, there have been reports of very slight earthquakes within recent years according to Mr. Lupton. It is possible, geologists believe, that the folding in southeastern Colorado in the vicinity of the Sierra Grande arch, which runs from its highest point about 40 miles east of Raton, N. M., north-easterly into Colorado, may be gradually through the centuries, pushing up a new range of mountains. If the readjustment of the earth's crust were perfect when the faults became inactive and "dead," ages ago, and if there have been no substantial readjustments of weight on the earth's surface since then, the likelihood is, geologists say, that the faults will never cause earthquake shocks again for centuries or ages.

PHYSICIAN SAYS VITAMIN CRAZE IS OVERWORKED
COPENHAGEN, July 31.—Talk about vitamins is a matter of fashion rather than a necessary adjunct to public health, is the opinion of Dr. S. Monrad, Chief of the Queen Louise Children's Hospital, expressed in a recent discussion of the subject.

With regard to the modern vitamin industry, Dr. Monrad said: "The public has vitamins on the brain, and in things like that, news always becomes interested, which is quite natural. It will prove a great business success for a couple of years when the movement will die away, and nothing more will be heard of the vitamins. If children are given ordinary, well made food they thrive well. A sickness like the Children's Scourge (the Barlow disease) is never seen now. It was due to the lack of C-vitamins, but since the rational care for children has progressed so much and since the milk is boiled less, it has disappeared so that I cannot now even show it to my students. "Apparently the children are to be filled with vitamins now, and I am afraid it is just as bad as ever, because then too few. It has, in fact, been proved that it is possible to call forth excess in fat by giving them too many vitamins, and I consider it probable that the same thing will apply to our children."

Relative to a proposal of mixing vitamins with margarine, Dr. Monrad said: "If they commenced mixing vitamins in vegetable margarine, I shall not know how to butter the bread of the many, many children, who for years and years cannot stand animal fat. There is every reason seriously to warn against these endeavors to overload these poor children with vitamins. And when all comes to all, what do we

HONOR OF CHINESE FAMILY SAVED BY FAKE FUNERAL

PEKING, July 31.—How the grandmother of a sixteen year old Chinese girl, Miss Lu, untangled a matrimonial snarl by means of a pretended funeral wherein the granddaughter was cast for the chief role in current tenuous gossip. Miss Lu was affianced to Mou Yung-ching, 24, who was in the service of the Chinese Executive, Tsoo Kun. Mou had some position and had saved some money, and the marriage was to have occurred in July. While preparations were under way, however, it became known to the parents of Miss Lu that Mou had lost his situation in the executive household and that he had squandered his savings. An engagement between Chinese young people is a serious affair, involving the honor of both families. It is a contract not easily annulled, so that the question of saving their daughter from union with a penniless husband gave the parents of Miss Lu great concern. When they had about decided that there was no way out, the grandmother stepped into the breach. She caused a coffin to be purchased and brought to the family home. The family went into mourning and word was spread abroad that Miss Lu was dead. The funeral was carried out in most solemn style, one of the conspicuous mourners being Mou Yung-ching.

After it was all over Mo discovered the ruse and learned that his promised bride had been spirited away and married to another who was well to do and who had assumed all the expense of the funeral and mourning. Mo is reported to be suing the parents for breach of contract and damages.

PUBLIC SEES ONLY SMALL PART OF DEVELOPED FILMS

LOS ANGELES, July 31.—The footage in the film flashed upon the screen in the motion picture theatre is but a fraction of the tremendous amount used in its production. Thousands of feet of the narrow celluloid pass daily through dark rooms and laboratories of motion picture studios that dot the vicinity of Los Angeles. At one large production plant near here approximately 750,000 feet of film weekly or 40,000,000 feet yearly go through processes that result in the picture which pass in review before millions of theatre-goers throughout the world.

Although the audience sees, in a six-reel production, only about 6,000 feet of film, often as much as 150,000 to 400,000 feet are taken. Two cameras are trained on the scene, both photographed while sometimes as many as five others are used in order that the scene may be taken from every possible angle and at different speeds. Out of the mass of film developed, on each production, the cutting department and editorial workers select the "master" negative from which the release prints are made. These are printed by machine and placed on mammoth drums which revolve slowly through developing solutions. Hundreds of prints of the "master" negative are made and sent to all corners of the globe.
