SHIPMENTS OF PEARS FROM CALIFORNIA TO BE HEAVY THIS YEAR

Speaking of the pear crop conditions in California, the California Fruit Exchange of Sacramento said in its last edition of "The Blue Anchor," that the Sacramento River section usually ships the big majority of its pears to the eastern markets and this is the case again in 1925. The River crop is somewhat heavier than last year and the quality is said to be excellent. According to estimates, in El Dorado county the pear crop is a quarter less than last year, while Placer and Solano counties are about the same as last year. The Santa Clara Valley has less than 1924, Carmel Valley about the same as last year and Lake county practically the same as 1924. Antelope Valley in southern California has about half a crop.

VIENNA, July 31.—Dr. Joseph Breuer, one of the most widely noted of psychoanalysts, died recently at the age of 82. As early as 1882 he was credited with curing with the aid of hypnosis a pronounced case of hysteria in a woman.

It was this epoch making cure which is said to have led Dr. Sigmund Freud, 14 years younger than Dr. Breuer, to build up a psycho-analytic system of his own. Subsequently, both scientists collaborated in settling down their experiences on this subject in a book entitled "The Psychic Mechanism of Hysterical Problems," published in 1895, and in a later publication, "Hysteria."

### COMMERCIAL COMMISSION REFUSES DECIDUOUS FRUIT RATE CUT

The Interstate Commerce Commission has by unanimous vote, decided against the complaint of California fruit growers and shippers of fresh deciduous fruits to eastern markets, in which they have been seeking a rate reduction from the state growing out of the war of \$1.72 per hundred pounds to \$1.44, says the California Fruit News. The latter even would be materially above the present level. The Commerce Commission, however, finds, after careful consideration to the matters mentioned in the complaint of the California industry, that as a whole the rates assessed "are not unreasonable nor unduly prejudicial as alleged."

The complaint, which has been on the books for some time, was argued at material length before an examiner in San Francisco and has been promoted very actively by the California Growers and Shippers Protective League. It is now dismissed. Large growers and shippers here predict that there can be no development in one direction under this \$1.72 rate and point out that there is little opportunity of developing business in fresh deciduous fruits for the smaller markets of the country, in the interest of increased distribution, where they are compelled to pay this high transportation cost.
