WOODS WINS FROM MARSHFIELD MAN ON A DOUBLE FOUL

Sailor Jack Woods, transient lightweight wrestler, was in the city today from Marshfield, enroute to Cottage Grove, where he meets Ralph Hand tonight in a return bout. At Marshfield last night Woods was awarded the decision over Charles Davis of that city, on a foul. Anceored by Wood's trick of grabbing him by the shoulders and jerking him face downward on the mat with terrific force—permissible under wrestling rules—Davis floored the Texan with a clout to the jaw, ignoring the referee's warning not to repeat the act. Davis made another swing at Woods about ten minutes later. Woods dodged the blow and the referee immediately declared him the winner. This ended the bout after a period of 45 minutes without either man having gained a fall.

At his first meeting with Hand a week ago, Woods lost the decision for kicking Hand under the chin after having won a fall. The Texan was accompanied to Cottage Grove today by Charles Clough, father of Roseburg's boxing commission, who will act as matchmaker for Woods for an indefinite time. While enroute, Mr. Clough will keep his eyes open for good material for bouts in Roseburg during the coming fall. He will of necessity remain from the city boxing commission, but upon his return to this city after his tour with Woods he will probably be seen in the role of the commission's matchmaker. The demand from local fans for bouts has not been large enough to justify any cards during the hot weather, but it is expected that a series of good, clean bills will be started the latter part of the year.

WARRANT ISSUED CHARGING THEFT OF FORD SEDAN

A warrant has been issued for the arrest of J. C. Hart, charging him with auto theft. Hart is thought to be at Long Beach, California. The first of the week he was in Southern and was negotiating with the Allen Hansen company for the purchase of a Ford sedan. He took the machine out for a trial. It is alleged, and is still trying it. A telegram was received last night by the Allen Hansen company, from a firm in Long Beach, asking if Hart could give a clear title to the machine, and the officers believe that he is endeavoring to sell it at Long Beach. They have wired his description to the police authorities of that city, and hope to secure his arrest and the recovery of the automobile.

LARGE AUDIENCE SEES EXHIBITION OF MARKSMANSHIP

A large crowd gathered at the Roseburg Rod and Gun Club grounds yesterday evening to witness the shooting exhibition by Gus Peret, of Yoncalla, well known marksman, shooting for the Peters Cartridge Company. Mr. Peret gave an excellent exhibition, shooting two different shot guns, a 30-30 rifle, a .22 rifle, two .28 revolvers, and two .22 rifles. He broke flying targets drew pictures, shot chalk from between his wife's lips, and broke targets which she held in her hands. The large crowd was apparently well pleased with the exhibition, which was a remarkable display of ability as a marksman.

ORGANIZE TO SEEK FEDERAL AID FOR COLUMBIA PROJECT

PORTLAND, July 31.—Plans for a concerted drive upon Washington, D. C., to obtain federal aid for the development of the Columbia basin reclamation project were outlined at the reorganization meeting of the trustees of the project league held today in the chamber of commerce.

Most important of the steps taken was the appointment of E. M. Goodwin, former secretary of the interior, as the Washington representative of the league. He will give his entire time to the task of obtaining action from the department of the interior and from congress for the development of the project.

The next important step was the appointment of Fred A. Adams as secretary. He will have no assistants in his office. This action was deemed necessary for economy. Adams has recently held the position as educational director. Officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: President, Harvey Lindley, Seattle; vice-president, W. L. Tolson, Portland; J. W. Landon, Walla Walla; and Karl Forman, Sand Point, Idaho.

President Lindley appointed as an executive committee Roy E. Gill, Spokane; J. W. Leddon, Walla Walla; Samuel H. Hedeen, Seattle; and J. W. Laird, Pocatello, Idaho.

STATE PROHIB HEAD TO SUBMIT ARREST

KIAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 31.—W. S. Levens, state prohibition commissioner, was expected to arrive here by noon today to submit to arrest following a secret indictment charging him with larceny which was returned by the grand jury early this week.

The head of the state's prohibition forces is charged with the theft of a revolver from Anton Garcia during an unsuccessful liquor raid here two weeks ago, when Levens was here on an inspection trip on conditions in Klamath Falls. Garcia was investigated by the grand jury on a charge of having concealed weapons in his possession, but the probbers returned a not true bill.

SALEM, Ore., July 31.—William S. Levens, state prohibition commissioner, left voluntarily last night for Klamath Falls where he was indicted by the grand jury yesterday on a charge of larceny of a revolver. Levens said that he believed his endorsement of E. L. Elliott for the appointment as district attorney in Klamath county had incensed a faction opposed to Elliott and may have inspired the indictment. Also a statement made by him that Klamath Falls was the worst town in the state for violations of the prohibition law, he believes, may have had something to do with it.
