IMPURE WATER IS CAUSE OF TYPHOID CASES AT SCHOOL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., Aug. 1.—Three
boys at the state training school
were reported by Superintendent
Gilbert today as critically ill with
typhoid fever as a result of drink-
ing water from contaminated wells
at the site of the new training
school near Woodburn. The report
was made at a meeting of the state
board of control, and the board
will take steps to purify the water.
Samples of the water was submit-
ted to the state board of health
for test after the boys became ill,
and the wells were condemned.
The new school is under construc-
tion and will be occupied the com-
ing fall or winter. The illness of
the boys was contracted from old
wells on the site. A less serious
contamination was found in a new
well.

SPRINGFIELD STORE SAFE IS WRECKED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 1.—When
the office of the Springfield Mill
and Grain company was opened
this morning a shattered safe and
scattered contents on the floor
showed that some night visitors,
presumed to be amateur yeggs, had
invaded the plant. No money was
missing, but a number of papers,
including contracts, bonds, insur-
ance policies and between \$30 and
\$40 in gasoline coupons are gone.
Springfield residents near the
plant reported hearing a heavy ex-
plosion some time between the
hours of 2:30 and 4 a. m. The door
and bottom of the safe were com-
pletely wrecked.

LOCAL TELEPHONE EMPLOYEES TO SELL COMPANY'S STOCK

Inauguration of the American
Telephone and Telegraph company
thrift plan for the purchase of
company stock on partial payment
arrangements will be effective in
Roseburg within a day or so
through an office authorized by
the State Corporation Commission-
er, J. R. Farrington, Manager, of
The Pacific Telephone and Tele-
graph company announced the new
plan today.

This office will be a branch of
the Bell Telephone Securities com-
pany, which was formed several
years ago to pioneer the direct
sales and partial payment thrift
plan. Headquarters will be estab-
lished in the main business office
of the company at the Telephone
Building and J. R. Farrington will
be in direct charge of the transac-
tions.

Every employee of the Tele-
phone company will be a salesman
for the Securities company and
will take applications for purchase
of the stock on either a cash or
partial payment basis. Since a
separate sales force will not be
maintained there will be no added
cost in operating the thrift plan.

Prior to extension of this ar-
rangement to Oregon, purchasers
of A. T. & T. stock had been forced
to make direct purchases through
brokers.

Farrington announced that the
partial payment option provided
for drafting of contracts providing
for payment of \$10 per share per
month. Interest of six per cent on
all partial payments will be allowed
and in the event a purchaser
desires to cancel his agreement,
his money will be returned plus
four per cent.

"The stock purchased is not new
or treasury stock," said Farrington,
"but is stock that has been issued
and listed on the New York
stock exchange and is bought for
purchasers through brokers who
are members of the exchange."

"Employees of the company are
offering free the facilities of their
organization to assist investors in
obtaining A. T. & T. stock either
by cash or monthly payments. The
American Telephone company has
pioneered in this plan and during
the past several years has placed
more than 1,000,000 shares of stock
with more than 136,000 individu-
als."

ELIMINATE DETOUR AT OAKLAND AFTER COURT OBJECTS

Following the action of the county
court in condemning the detour
north of Oakland, the highway
has been opened at intervals to-
day, and cars are coming through
with little delay.

The contractor at Oakland is fil-
ling in an approach to the bridge,
and in doing so is using a steam-
shovel and several big trucks,
which keep the highway blocked
much of the time. A detour was ar-
ranged by way of the Chenoweth
cut-off, four miles north of Oak-
land, then over the Goodrich high-
way by way of Cole hill, and
through old Oakland back to the
highway.

The detour was five miles in
length and was over a very bad
road. It also cut motorists out of
four miles of paved road.
The county court objected to
such a long dangerous detour,
when the work being done blocked
only about 150 yards of the high-
way, with plenty of room for a tem-
porary detour around.

As a result of the remonstrance
cases are being advised through to-
day, and a good detour will prob-
ably be provided through the ad-
joining field the first of the week.

BEND HAS TWO NEW LIGHTNING FIRES

BEND, Ore., Aug. 1.—Two forest
fires have so far been reported as
a result of a slight electric storm
late yesterday, one of the fires in
the Sisters region and the other in
the Lapine district and neither is
serious, according to forestry
officials.
Haze over the mountains today
prevented clear views of the forest
in some places. Only a light rain
accompanied the electric storm in
the forest. It was reported from the
various lookout stations. The rela-
tive humidity today is high and
fire conditions are good, officials
reported this afternoon.

face were cut and bruised.
