### STREET FLUSHER IS ADJUNCT TO FIRE DEPARTMENT

The auto truck street flusher recently purchased by the city is proving a valuable addition to the city's fire fighting equipment. As the truck carries its own water tank, and has a small pump for delivering water at high pressure, it is of great aid in small fires, particularly grass fires, where it can reach places where it is impossible to get water from fire hydrants. The department also expects to use the machine for big fires in the future. Whenever the department has a fire that is sparking badly, that is throwing up embers and burning particles to be carried by the wind, the flusher will be called into use. It can be moved quickly from place to place to soak down roofs and to put out fires starting from flying sparks, leaving the fire apparatus undisturbed at the main blaze. An order was sent in yesterday for 250 feet of inch and a half hose to be kept on the flusher constantly for this purpose. A coupling is also provided, so that for fires where additional hose is needed ordinary garden hose can be used. By killing the motor a stream of water can be put through this hose with high pressure, providing ample water for small roof fires or grass fires. Because of the value of this machine to the fire department a garage is being built for it in the rear of the fire hall, where it will be obtainable at any time of day or night.

### DESERTED WOMAN BECOMES MOTHER AFTER EVICTION

(Associated Press Local Wire.) CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—Deserted by her husband and father and evicted from her only home, Mrs. Anne Cooper, 19, gave birth to a child as she lay on the roadside in the village of Phoenix, southwest of Chicago. The baby died a few hours later in an infirmary where it and the mother were taken in a hearse, because no ambulance was available. Physicians there attributed the death to exposure and premature birth induced by the sight of a pistol in the hands of the evicting constable. An investigation by the coroner will be asked and an inquest held. The mother is in a serious condition. Mrs. Cooper is one of eleven children. Since her father deserted three years ago, her mother, Mrs. John Max, and the elder children earned a pittance by working for farmers. They fell behind in their rent. Then Mrs. Cooper's husband left. Mrs. Max said the constable had evicted them after telling them they were squatters and giving them a week to move.



### SPECIMENS FOR EXHIBIT AT STATE FAIR ARE WANTED

Collection of the county's exhibit for the state fair has started under the direction of C. O. Garrett of Glendale. The county has made its annual appropriation of \$750 from the fair fund to aid Mr. Garrett in his work, and this money will be used to pay for the gathering and shipment of the exhibits and the placing of the Douglas county display in the pavilion at Salem. Mr. Garrett states that Douglas county will have the same space as last year, the booth being in an excellent location. Indications are that the display will surpass any previous exhibit the county has ever made, and should rank very high. The cooperation of all farmers in the county is urged by Mr. Garrett, who is particularly anxious to secure good specimens of threshed grains.

### TORNADO SWEEPS GERMANY; REPEATS RUIN IN HOLLAND

A girl whose name was unknown was seriously hurt, and E. R. Collins, El Paso, Texas, slightly injured. More than 50 persons were bruised and shaken. J. T. Hardy, general agent for the railroad here, ascribed the accident to a broken bolt in a switch.

CELTIC CONGRESS FEARS IRISH LANGUAGE DYING OUT

DUBLIN, Aug. 12.—(A. P.)—There was recently concluded in Dublin an interesting congress representing all sections of the Celtic race, delegates attending from Gaelic Scotland, from Wales and from Brittany. The discussions were largely concerned with the preservation of the Irish language. Eamon De Valera said that emigration from the Irish speaking districts of Ireland was the greatest difficulty to be contended with. He was satisfied he declared, that those at the head of affairs could, if they wished, get the money to establish industries to keep the Gael home. Other speakers said the language was dying because the native speakers set no value on it. Professor Griffith of Wales said that any amount of teaching of the language in the schools was of no more use in saving it "than a fishing symbol" unless there were put into it something that gave dignity to the person who spoke it. It was urged that emigration from the Irish speaking districts should be stopped. A resolution was adopted unanimously declaring that Irish should be essential in the final examination for degrees in every college for doctors, lawyers and engineers, and that laws should be passed accordingly.

THE MARVELOUS CHINESE.

A book by Dr. Thomas F. Carter, just from the press of Columbia University, treats of "The Invention of Printing in China and Its Spread Westward." The book contains a photographic reproduction of the world's oldest book, a sacred Buddhist text published in China about 868 A. D.

This antedates by several centuries Gutenberg and Coster, who are rival claimants to the title of inventor of printing in Europe. The Chinese were printing books; they were conducting literary examinations for civil service applicants; they were steering ships by the magnetic needle when our forebears were struggling through the mists of the dark ages and staring Bewulf about the camp fire.

Anglo-Saxon supremacy is in part the result of a series of fortunate accidents. An industrial civilization increased the population of Europe to abnormal limits. Just in time, new land in America and Australia absorbed the surplus and increased wealth enormously. As a fruit seller in the market said a day or two ago, "You Americans had it easy."

Meantime, the Chinese had it hard. They have the tough fiber which is the reward of that hardship. They have a long standing respect for learning, and minds trained to incredible feats of memory. They have the adaptability of the Jew, the good nature of the Negro, the persistence of the Scot.

When 400,000,000 people with such qualities and such a background of experience, get into action, our standards of racial comparison may have to be revised. The courageous support of China in its present helplessness will win for the United States the friendship of a mighty people.—Portland Telegram.

### RIVAL RAILROADS BUY TRACK SPACE AT KLAMATH FALLS

(Associated Press Local Wire.) KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Aug. 12.—Eight acres of land purchased by the city for city park purposes five years ago for \$11,750, was sold last night to the Southern Pacific and the Oregon Trunk railroads for \$62,000. Both rail lines sought it for trackage purposes. The Oregon Trunk purchased two acres for \$15,000 while the Southern Pacific purchased the remaining 6.2 acres for \$47,000. The city park board, which negotiated the sale, announced that the proceeds would be used for the purchase of another park site.

(Continued from page 1.) by the cutter Thetis, she has patrolled the icy ocean every season since. The Bear carried to Alaska an original reindeer herd of 800 from Siberia that has increased to 400,000.

Famous Rescue Recalled

One of the rescues of the Bear, often called the good Samaritan of the north Pacific, was that of the crew of the whaler James Allen, in 1894 at Segum Pass, 15 miles wide, between Amila and Segum Islands of the Andreanof group in the Aleutians. Captain F. G. Dodge, now commanding the coast guard in the north Pacific and Alaska, with headquarters here was on the Bear then. When the good Samaritan reached a few remaining members of the whaler's crew, the castaway had eaten one of their number and were starting on another.

The Bear, under command of Captain Winfield Scott Schley, rescued a nexploration expedition led by A. W. Greeley, after major-general, which reached the furthest north point at that time and suffered almost unprecedented hardships and losses.

A cruise of the Bear in to the Arctic runs 15,000 to 20,000 miles. She winters in San Francisco and outfits in Seattle.
