WORDS AVAIL NOTHING.

Dorothy Ellingsen, the San Francisco "jazz girl" is again on trial for killing her mother. She is 17. Back in Pennsylvania a youth reads and dines nonchalantly in jail after killing his father and almost killing his mother, about whose condition he has expressed no concern. He is also 17. In Kansas City, Missouri, yesterday a young man who quit school and home to become a tramp, confessed that he murdered a man who had given him a "lift" in the latter's automobile. He is 19. Further enumeration is not necessary. These cases are merely three among an appallingly large number of their kind within the past few years, not to mention a countless number of lesser offenses that mark the gradual and easy approach to homicide. Are parents getting less capable of rearing children, or is modern life presenting too many unhealthy allurements to be combatted by home and school training? Or has the struggle for material wealth or even bare existence become so absorbing that children are freed of parental restraint and moral guidance? The courts, legislators, editors, ministers, authorities and welfare workers have exhausted their vocabularies in the denunciation of the laxities of modern youth and vied with each other in advice to correct them. It has availed nothing. Why not abandon words and try action. Future citizenship would justify Spartan methods if all else failed.

No report has come in of ministers going on strike, and less is heard from them in the way of complaint about their pay, than from any of the various classes of people in the community. And yet the average salary of ministers has probably been advanced less in the past 10 years than in the case of any of the various occupations. A minister who has taken pledges to work unselfishly for the community, hates to appear in a position where it looks as if he were considering money. And yet his family need the usual amount of bread and butter. He would feel his career had been a failure if he could not educate his children. It is well to think of the untiring service that these men render. We need to attract the highest type of young men into this noble calling, but it can't be done if the minister is not given adequate support.

Oregon (Bert) Jones, the notorious outlaw confined in the Oregon penitentiary, was killed at that institution last evening, but not until he had taken the lives of two guards. Jones, as usual, was the star performer of last night's outbreak. He was a dangerous fellow and called into service criminals of a low grade to help carry out his prearranged plans. The regrettable feature of the riot is that fact that two men lost their lives and another is at death's door in exchange for the hide of a notorious and worthless criminal.

The fine new high school building, now under construction, to accommodate this city's constantly increasing population, is being rapidly pushed to completion. When ready for occupancy Roseburg will have ample school room for caring for its children of school age. Last year's congested condition was a great detriment to the welfare of our boys and girls.

The business men of Roseburg will employ a night man to look after their business houses. Sensible conclusion, and one that should have been reached long ago. The regular night officers co-operating, will give the business district the protection it rightfully deserves and lessen greatly the chances for both fire and thievery.

Roseburg is building in a conservative, yet very flattering way and many important improvements are being made to business structures and private property. There is no boom here—never has been—but a brighter outlook for future development has never been as pronounced as during the present summer.

MERCHANTS HIRE "DOC" MARTIN AS NIGHT WATCHMAN

"Doc" E. S. Martin has been employed as merchants police, and has entered upon his duties. The business houses on Jackson street between Washington and Cass streets, including the establishments in the block on Cass street, between Jackson and Rose, on the north side of the street, have joined in the employment of a night watchman. The merchants selected Mr. Martin for this work as he has had considerable experience in this line. He has served on the police force in several large cities, and has been employed as an officer on several different occasions locally.

The officer will patrol the beat at frequent intervals through the night and will endeavor to prevent future robberies in any of the stores in his district. This action was taken by the merchants owing to the large number of wholesale robberies in Oregon towns, together with the fact that several local stores have been entered this year. Mr. Martin was a police guard at the Trans-Mississippi Exposition in 1908, and was on the police force at Omaha and was deputy sheriff in King county, Washington, for a number of years. He has also served at various times on the city police force at Roseburg and Marshfield.

PARTS OF BEAR'S ANATOMY SOUGHT AS HEALTH CHARMS. OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 11.—Chinese faith in the curative qualities of selected portions of a bear's anatomy has resulted in several unique assignments for government hunters operating in this state, declares Dr. Glenn R. Bach, field leader for the federal bureau of the biological survey in the Washington district. Recently, a Chinese resident of Washington, D. C., requested the feet of a bear while some months ago another asked for a bear's gall bladder. In the case of the gall bladder, the information was volunteered that it was wanted as a health charm. Such a talisman when worn around the neck, it was averred, assured the wearer 1,000 years of life. Although the supposed qualities of bears' feet were not disclosed, the hunters have been instructed to forward the first set of brim's feet available to the Olympia office for shipment to Washington. They also have been instructed to use salt sparingly in the curing process. This essential was neglected in the case of the gall bladder, with the result that the talisman arrived in such a condition that officials were prone to believe that the warmer the weather the more powerful the charm would prove.
