PEORIA, Ill., Aug. 13.—Four men held up the mail truck which had just been loaded with mail from the Chicago-bound Chicago, Burlington and Quincy train today and escaped with an unestimated amount of registered mail. The robbery occurred at the station just as the train pulled out. The robbers escaped. Burlington train No. 9, enroute to Denver, arrived here at 1:28 and the mail messenger had just loaded a registered pouch into his truck when the youth, flourishing a pistol, confronted him and ordered him to drive west. Post office officials here were uninformed as to the contents of the registered pouch, but said that it usually contained valuable shipments.
