He warns the merchants and other advertisers that they must make their newspaper advertising as interesting to the reader as the news columns, comic strips, crossword puzzles and other departments if they would have the advertisements read.

COUNTY HAS BIG WILD BLACKBERRY CROP THIS YEAR

Several hundred people throughout the county are making wages of \$5 or better daily picking wild blackberries for canning, according to A. J. Geddes, manager of the Roseburg cannery.

The cannery is paying 5 cents per pound for blackberries, and many pickers are taking over 100 pounds daily, the berries being brought in to Roseburg from practically every section of the county.

The fact that there is no expense connected with the picking of the blackberry crop, or in getting it to market, other than the hauling cost, the wild blackberry crop should eventually become quite a factor in the county.
