UMPQUA CHIEFS DISCUSS PLANS FOR STATE FAIR

Stunt and Playlet to Be Presented on Hospitality Day at Salem.

PROGRESS IS MADE

Committees at Work on Stunt and Playlet Plans, and Expect to Complete Details Soon.

A special meeting of the Umpqua Chiefs was held last night for the purpose of taking up matters relative to the participation of that organization in the State Fair program on Hospitality Day.

O. M. Berrie advised the Chiefs that he will be making a trip to North Bend in a few days and that he will visit M. W. Taylor, president of the State Hospitality Club, and at that time work out a program for the day, and that an effort will be made through the state organization to have every club in the state represented in competition for the cups which the fair committee is offering.

A. C. Marsters urged the chiefs to make a good showing with a full attendance and a cleverly worked out stunt, calling attention to the beneficial advertising which can be obtained in that manner for the community.

R. W. Bates urged the employment of a person trained in dramatic and theatrical work to direct the playlet, in order that the entertainment may have a finished appearance as far as possible. As a result of his talk, the committee was instructed to employ such a person if they deemed it necessary.

Last night's meeting was called for the particular purpose of procuring the stunt uniform which it was decided at a former meeting to have made.

The committee on stunts and playlet reported that they are making progress and expect soon to have their entertainment ready to submit to the organization. They were authorized to take full charge of these features.

"The Dirty Dozen" were appointed to compose a drill team to put on a special stunt, to be garbed in brooch, clout, head-dress and moccasins, or such other paraphernalia as Chief Kavitson should desire to select. Mr. Kavitson agreed to take charge of this feature, and to drill the team, which will be made up of Lee Wells, H. C. Darby, H. S. French, Arthur March, Walter Dat, Tom Ness, Foster Bltner, George Smith, Frank J. Hills, A. B. Crawford, Roy Young, Guy Gordon and W. O. Clinger.

He was in the coast district at the time of the accident and knew nothing of the accident until it was officially reported to him.

THIRTY-TWO FIRES ON UMPQUA FOREST TO PRESENT TIME

According to a report received this afternoon from O. C. Houser, central dispatcher on the Umpqua National Forest, there have been 32 forest fires on the forest during the season, up to the present time. Twenty-three of these were lightning fires, leaving nine which were man-caused. In six of the man-caused fires, the persons starting them have been convicted. Only two of the 32 fires were over ten acres in size. Mr. Houser reports a serious fire in eastern Lane county, near the Umpqua forest line. The fire covers between 75 and 100 acres and may come over on the forest. It is being handled by the Lane county patrol.

The Douglas county patrol this afternoon reported the Reuben fire to be out. This fire gave considerable trouble, but was handled last night by a large force of men. The only fire now burning is a small blaze on Paradise creek.
