OIL SUPPLY PLENTIFUL

Notwithstanding its daily use in enormous quantities, the supply of petroleum products in the United States is in no danger of a shortage. Far from it, we are assured in a report issued after an exhaustive investigation by a commission which included, among others, four members of President Coolidge's cabinet.

The report draws particular attention to two impending developments of very great importance. One is the extension within the industry of "cracking" crude oil, a process which increases the yield of the all-important gasoline.

Altogether, the findings of the committee are reassuring. There may be passing periods of shortage of petroleum, but there is no danger in the situation.

For all forms of life and property insurance the American people pay annually about \$3,500,000,000—a sum far greater than that paid by the next richest nation for such protection.

LAND PRODUCTS SHOW IS SET FOR SEPTEMBER 25

Annual Products Exhibit to Be Held in Armory—Premium List Given.

SHOW IS COUNTY-WIDE

Chamber of Commerce Assisting Growers—Expect Even Better Exhibits Than Last Year.

A premium list for the second annual Land Products show to be held in September 25 and 26 was announced today from the chamber of commerce office.

Last year the show was a success and it is thought that this year's exhibition of Douglas county products will rival that of last year.

The show is being sponsored by the chamber of commerce in cooperation with various organizations and farmers.

Individual farm exhibits will be given booths at the show. Space will be divided equally between the various classes of products.

Rules and Regulations. 1. All exhibits must be 1925 crop grown by exhibitor or exhibitors.

2. All booths in each class shall be uniform size for group display and all exhibits shall be confined within the booth rail.

3. All painting and decorations must be removed from the walls and ceiling not later than 48 hours after the close of the fair.

4. All articles must be correctly labeled.

5. All exhibits must be in place and ready for inspection on or before 3 o'clock p. m. Thursday, September 24. Failure to meet this requirement shall be considered a default of five points against the score of the exhibit.

6. Any exhibitor having no competition may be given first or second prize at the discretion of judges.

7. First premium exhibits in Division A-B-C become property of Roseburg Home and Land Products Show.

Booth Exhibits. Division A (Class 1)—Grange or Community booths. All Grange or Community booths receiving 50 per cent will be entitled to a bonus of \$25.00 in addition to any prize money won by them.

Individual Farm Exhibit. Class 2—Rules as for Grange or Community booths.

Individual Vegetable Exhibits. Class 3—Each exhibit shall consist of at least ten table varieties.

Class 4—Quantity of Products, 50 per cent; 2nd, Diversity of Products, 30 per cent; 3rd, General Appearance, 20 per cent.

POULTRYMEN OF COUNTY TAKE UP MANY PROBLEMS

Committee Discusses Means for Enlarging Profits of the Industry.

WILL GATHER DATA

Complete Survey Planned of Commercial Flocks—Feed Importations Will Likely Cease.

Formulating of plans for the analysis of the poultry industry in the county and discussion of ways of means of increasing the profitability of this important agricultural enterprise was the principal business of the poultry committee of the Douglas county economic conference, which met Monday night in the office of County Agent Conway.

According to the 1919 census, the poultry industry in the county made up five per cent of the total agricultural income at that time, but it is now thought that the industry is responsible for 10 per cent of that revenue of the county. Such an enterprise, if well brought out at the committee meeting, should be conducted in such a manner as to permit its growth and development along economic lines.

In order to facilitate a poultry survey of the county to include those things not covered by the census, in which poultrymen will be interested and to make the committee more representative, the size of the poultry committee was enlarged.

Such questions as the number of commercial flocks in the county of 2.50 birds or over, the extent to which green feed is available in the average flock and the possibility of marketing fryers on a larger scale will all be covered in the survey.
