Controversy over the right of the commission to meet at this time centers upon the provision of law which authorized meetings of the commission only at specified times. Since the last meeting, however, contracts with publishers of text books have expired and the publishers have refused to renew them at the old price.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 20.—The state text book commission convened here this morning for a two-day session to select the text books to be used in the public schools. Despite the ruling of Attorney-General I. H. Van Winkle that whatever action would be taken by them today and tomorrow would be illegal, the commission will proceed to hear the bids of publishers and to award contracts for two-thirds of the state's text books.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—Radio receiving sets acquired a definite place in railroad freight schedules and became subject to higher freight rates in a decision today by the interstate commerce commission.

The decision increased the rates on radio sets and talking machines combined in less than a week from the first class rate to 41 times the first class rate. In many cases the increase in this respect will be fifty per cent.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—The names of 24 federal prohibition administrators who will take over enforcement of the nation's dry laws September 1, are expected to be made public tomorrow. Assistant Secretary Andrews of the treasury will confer with Secretary Mellon during the day, and it is expected the new dry personnel list will be presented for the secretary's approval.

PEAR CANNING TO OPEN FULL BLAST FIRST NEXT WEEK Pear canning which started at the Umpqua Valley Canning company plant Tuesday of this week is starting very light, according to an announcement from Manager A. J. Geddes today. The fruit is ripening slowly and only a small amount is coming in so far. All buying is from local growers. Only a part-time force is now employed at the cannery and little fruit is being put up at present. Mr. Geddes announces, however, that there is a good crop in this vicinity and as soon as they are ripened a full force will go on. He expects the big part of the crop to start coming in the first of next week. At present only an ordinary amount of fruit is being canned.
