## AMERICAN FLYER IN MOROCCO HURT WHEN PLANE TURNS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
CASA BLANCA, French Morocco, Aug. 22.—The American flying squadron volunteer for service with the French against the Rifians suffered its first casualty when Lieutenant-Colonel Charles Kerwood of Philadelphia fell during a training flight. He was painfully but not dangerously injured.

Colonel Kerwood was making his first flight alone for some years. He landed at excessive speed and his plane overturned, throwing him some distance. Comrades hurried him to a hospital, where his injuries were said to consist of severe cuts about the face and a broken arm. The airplane was wrecked.

Lieutenant-Colonel Kerwood was a member of the original La Fayette Escadrille, serving on the western front in 1916-1917. He was shot down in an aerial fight early in 1918 and captured by the Germans.

After the armistice he became a lieutenant-colonel in the air forces of Greece, continuing in that position until the fall of the monarchy. He was one of the first organizers of the volunteer squadron now in Morocco. He arrived at Casa Blanca to begin training last Monday.

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## ROSS DEPOSED AS FISH WARDEN; NEW HEAD E. I. BALLASH

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 22.—By a vote of two to one, Albert C. Ross, state fish warden, was deposed yesterday afternoon by the fish commission and Edison I. Ballash of St. Helens made his successor. W. T. Eakin of Astoria, opposed the removal despite a long conference with Chairman John C. Veatch, Portland, during a break in the meeting. J. S. Hayes, Bay City, moved the dismissal and Veatch voted with him.

No charges were placed against Ross, needed for harmony being given as the motive behind the removal. Ross' only comment was that "the fish trust had won."

The change is effective at once, although Ross will remain on the payroll for 60 days and will help Edison Ballash as much as possible. Ballash has been in charge of the St. Helens branch of the Columbia River Packers' Association for 18 years. Before that time he was employed on the Columbia by the Washington fish department.

In St. Helens he has served as councilman, mayor and representative from Columbia county in the 1919 session of the legislature. He is a Republican.

COAL PLAYS LEADING PART IN INTERNATIONAL POLITICS

BERLIN, Aug. 22.—(A. )—Coal still rises in Europe as an important political factor, being involved in many of the political and economic negotiations between the nations. Around it revolve many problems of industry, unemployment and diplomacy, with Germany, France, Poland, England and the Saar district all affected to a greater or less extent.

Recently coal proved the most important factor of a German-Polish controversy. Poland insists upon Germany taking a monthly allotment of 250,000 tons of Polish coal, whereas the German government has emphatically fixed the maximum of Polish coal imports at 100,000 tons.

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### "ORPHAN" SON AND "CHILDLESS" FATHER UNITED AFTER YEARS

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 22.—How would you feel if you were an old man, and in your own mind, one in the world, your only child having died, as you believed, and then to discover the son is alive? And how would you feel if you were a young man, successful in profession, but to feel the loneliness of being an orphan, as you think, then to hear the voice of your father over the phone.

This double-Enoch Arden kind of affair happened here. John V. Ables, of North Worth, Texas, in Atlanta on business, in looking up a number in a phone book, saw the name "Ables." Prompted by curiosity, he called the number. James H. Ables, the name of the young man who answered the phone, was doubtful if there was any relationship until the older Ables asked, almost breathlessly: "Who was your mother?" and it was then the tension broke, for the young man at the other end of the phone gave the name of the older man's wife, before she married.

"Why, you must be my son," the elder Ables replied, and in a few moments, the young man rushed from the phone to the hotel, where his father was stopping.

Young Ables was born in Texas in 1857, his mother died, his father being unable to care for the child as it should be reared, sent the boy to live with parents of the boy's mother in Alabama. Some time after that the elder Ables was injured in an explosion, and the boy was told that his father died, and shortly afterward, the father was notified that his son had died. Being unable to visit Alabama at that time, he did not make a personal visit to verify the statement. Correspondence then ceased, the father thinking his son dead.

Young Ables, when a young man, left Alabama, going to Manchester, where he remained until the World War. In 1917 he joined the 320th Infantry and was wounded in 1918, just before the armistice.

After the war, he settled in Atlanta, and is a member of the law firm of Westmoreland and Westmoreland, prominent attorneys.

"Although my son wants me to give up my position with Frick & Company, of Waynesboro, Pa., I shall continue with my firm, but I shall remain with my son until about September 1. It all seems like a story out of a book to me, and in my waking hours, I am afraid it is still a dream," said the elder Ables.
