HIGH SCHOOL TEAM TO START FOOTBALL PRACTICE SEPT. 7

Three Letter Men Form Backbone of Team This Year—Schedule Includes 7 Games.

Roseburg high school's 1925-26 football aspirants will get out on the field and begin taking hard knocks on the seventh of September and thereafter to get themselves in shape for the coming season, according to an announcement made today by Coach E. W. Doubet.

Work on preparing the grid for regular practice will be started immediately, says the coach. The "battlefield" will be laid off, goal posts erected and a tackling rack put up probably next week.

The line-up of men so far includes three letter men and one ineligible player of experience who may show up as soon as scholastic requirements have been complied with. Don Ferguson, captain and tackle has two letters to show for former games and will head the local boys this year. Ernest Forester, tackle, and Glade Bruton, backfield, are both letter men of one year's playing experience. Bert Lawrence is now ineligible, but Mr. Doubet expects that he will turn out later in the season.

The team this year will be of light timber, says the coach, and there is little to be announced about the swath which it will cut. The coach prefers to let developments speak for the merit of the team.

It is indicated by Mr. Doubet that a seven-game schedule has been arranged although it is not ready for publication. B. E. Larson, former coach and assistant coach last year, will again assist in coaching the team. Due to increased athletic activities Mr. Larson will be required to devote more time to sports this year than last.

LIFE SENTENCE 48 HOURS AFTER SHOOTING A MAN

VALENTINE Neb., Aug. 22.—Forty eight hours after Frank Allen, transient laborer, had shot from ambush and killed William Hecker, 40, bachelor-rancher near Merriam, he was under sentence of life imprisonment. Allen was captured by an angry posse, consisting of cowboys and ranchers but was saved from any violence by the sheriff and county attorney who drove him overland for about 70 miles, landing him safely in the Valentine jail. He pleaded guilty and late yesterday was sentenced to life imprisonment at Rushville, near here. He begged for the death penalty and said he killed Hecker because, "he put dope in my food and water."

GRASS FIRE SOUTH OF CITY THREATENS TELEPHONE POLES

A grass fire which covered a considerable extent of the hill east of the aviation field just south of town yesterday afternoon and last night gave telegraph and telephone linemen no end of worry in keeping the blaze from destroying poles and wires.

Communication was interrupted over the Postal Telegraph company's line for a period of two hours when the cross-arm on one pole was burned loose and fell, tanding the wires.

BOOZE PARTY IN AUTO MAKES JOB FOR UNDERTAKER

(Associated Press London Wire.) OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 22.—Walter Simmons, 23, reported to the Olympia police shortly after midnight this morning that he was the driver of the car which overturned on the Pacific highway four miles east of Olympia yesterday afternoon instantly killing Vernon King, 19, and seriously injuring Arthur Trotter. Simmons admitted to the police that he and other members of the party had been drinking and he is being held for investigation. Albert Rixe, owner of the car and one of its five occupants, was also probably seriously injured, it was reported this morning, although his injuries were at first considered slight. Rixe was riding in the rear seat alone, the other four lads being crowded into the front seat.

PIERCE IS STILL TELLING GRANGERS "WHAT I'VE DONE"

COQUILLE, Ore., Aug. 22.—Governor Pierce, speaking before the Coos county grand jury today, said "The farmer is confronted with many problems at this time and the greatest of these taxation.

"Since I became governor, I have reduced the direct levy by nearly \$2,000,000 and today it stands at \$7,500,000. If possible I will pattern the Oregon tax plan of the future along the lines of Ohio, where insurance companies are taxed more heavily than in Oregon. Insurance companies take \$25,000,000 annually from Oregon, giving little in return," the governor said.

"I believe public utilities should be made to bear the expense of state government as in Ohio and California, but I am opposed to California's plan of taxing public utilities direct and taking all such taxes from counties.

"The farmer of today should be the controlling factor over the world. He feeds the universe and by all means he should have something to say on what he shall receive as compensation for what he produces. It is wrong for farmers, and I have been one for 25 years, to produce and sell at just what is offered.

ENGINEER KILLED.

(Associated Press London Wire.) ROCHESTER, N. Y., Aug. 22.—The engineer was reported killed and a number of passengers hurt today, when an Erie passenger train was derailed at Conesus Lake Junction. First reports said that the locomotive and a crowded passenger coach had overturned.
