CARELESS TRAMP SETS FIRE TO BARN SOUTH OF DRAIN

DRAIN, Aug. 27.—(Special to the News-Review)—The barn of Mrs. Anna Fenton, located on the hill south of town was destroyed by fire about five o'clock Monday evening, the structure with about ten tons of hay being a total loss, with no insurance. It was at first thought that the fire resulted from spontaneous combustion but an examination of the premises revealed a partly burned package of cigarette papers which led to the belief that a hobo may have been sleeping in the place during the day and had carelessly thrown a stub burned match or cigarette partly down near the barn. Mrs. Fenton and her son, the only occupants of the place, were away from the place during the afternoon. Mrs. Fenton places her loss at about \$500 which she can ill afford.

CUSTER, WASH., BOYS HAVE NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH

Four Custer, Washington, boys had an almost miraculous escape from death or serious injury yesterday afternoon, when the Ford car, in which they were traveling to Medford, was crowded off the road and into the ditch at the aviation field, a short distance south of the city. The boys, Berget, Novall, Dwin, and Harold Grove, all of Custer, were on their way south, when a car driven by G. H. Gill, of Oakland, Oregon, passed them, going in the same direction. Another car was coming north, and the boys claim that in passing Gill cut in too close ahead of them and caught their front wheel and threw them off the grade. The car was turned down the steep incline and had almost reached the bottom when a front wheel collapsed causing the machine to turn upside down. All four of the boys were caught underneath but managed to crawl out, with the exception of Harold, who had to be pulled out, leaving one shoe pinned under the auto. The car was heavily loaded with provisions and bedding, and a sack of salt broke open and spilled salt in one of the boys' eyes, which was the only injury sustained by any of them. BANCROFT'S DEATH MOURNED BY JAPAN

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—Ambassador Tazuo Matsudaira, Japan's representative at Washington, came here to pay his nation's last tribute to the late Edgar A. Bancroft, who died in Tokyo, where he was the ambassador from the United States.
Ambassador Matsudaira became acquainted with Mr. Bancroft while serving as Minister of Foreign Affairs.

"Everyone who knew the ambassador regarded him as a man of fine character," said Ambassador Matsudaira as he arrived from Washington.
"He endeared himself to all with whom he came in contact. His death was a great blow to Japan as well as America."
"You lost a worthy representative and we lost a good man."
"So I am here in respect to his memory to pay a last tribute. For many years to come we will feel his loss. He arrived in Japan at a rather difficult time. Although he was there only a short time, the Japanese people will mourn his death for many years."

IT'S ALL RIGHT WITH U. S.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Aug. 27.—Mexico will begin paying her \$100,000,000 national debt, owed chiefly to the United States, about September 1, according to A. Mellas, Consul-general for Mexico at New York, financial agent for that government and brother of President Plutarco Calles, who passed through here today.
Mexico discharged her domestic debts August 13 when 20,000,000 pesos were paid private institutions of that country.

ANGLO-FRENCH WAR DEBT TERMS GIVE U. S. FIGURE BASE

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—The feature of the Anglo-French debt settlement which involves the question of the French ability to pay is regarded here as having an important bearing on the forthcoming Franco-American debt discussion here.
Acting Secretary Winston of the treasury said that obviously the amount France has agreed to pay the London government will have to be considered by the American debt commission when it analyzes the capacity of the French nation to liquidate its obligations here.
Mr. Winston added, however, that the relationship of this government to those nations which owe it money, is strictly that of a creditor, while the relationship between the allied debtors and creditors is complicated in his opinion, by questions confided strictly to European affairs.
