MURDER GUILT NOT YET FIXED IN LOREN CASE

to subject her to further questioning.

Another section of scalp, a soft-edged blanket and a man's hunting coat bearing what officials believed to be blood stains were found late yesterday some distance from the El Cerrito swamp and in the vicinity of the Bay shore at Cozy Cove. The scalp fragment was found in the swamp proper not far from where other portions of the woman's head was discovered.

Rowe admitted under questioning that he made an auto trip to Los Angeles with his brother Robert, leaving here August 13 and returning August 17, officials said. Authorities have been unable to trace to their satisfaction the movements of Mrs. Loren during that period. Rowe today continued to deny that he visited Mrs. Loren at her hotel in San Francisco between the dates of August 17 and August 19, when hotel employees declare a man whom they identified yesterday as Rowe visited the woman and on one of the two alleged visits accompanied her out of the hotel.

Latest developments have caused investigators to lean toward the theory that the woman was killed outright instead of dying from the effects of an operation.

A message was sent to Special Agent Wood here, and he asked the local police to arrest the negroes. Only one was seen here, however, and as he was unarmed, and denied being a member of the party, he was not kept in custody.

\$28 WEEKLY, 60 PER CENT OVER \$11-OREGON BARBERS

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 28.—Increase from \$25 to a minimum of \$28 a week in the scale of journeymen barbers was granted by the Oregon state board of conciliation today.

Proprietors of one of the largest shops in the city said the increase in wages is not likely to cause a jump in the price of service to patrons. The Barbers' Union sought an increase with a minimum of \$19 a week. It also asked for 50 per cent of receipts over \$12 a week. Barbers are now receiving 60 per cent on receipts over \$37 a week. The board granted 60 per cent over \$41 a week.
