UNMARRIED PAIR QUARREL; DOUBLE TRAGEDY RESULTS

Oakridge Railroad Worker
Shoots Woman Twice,
Then Turns Gun
on Himself

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 31.—Herbert C. Price, 45, and Miss Cleo Nelson, 26, are both dead as a result of a quarrel at Oakridge Saturday evening. Price, a sailor of Miss Nelson, first turned the gun he carried on the woman, killing her outright, and then shot himself. He died in a Eugene hospital yesterday.

The shooting, which took place in a little house by the river at Oakridge, where the woman had been living since the two came there together about a year ago, was said to be the result of a quarrel. Miss Nelson wanted to return to the East. Price did not want her to.

Residents of Oakridge heard three shots. Gordon Wells, deputy district attorney here, was notified and hastened to Oakridge. When he entered the house he found the woman dead on her bed, two bullet wounds having pierced her lips and lodged in her brain. Price was stretched at her feet with a bullet wound in his forehead above the right eye.

Price did not regain consciousness. It is reported that he has a father living in Spokane, Wash., and authorities are trying to get in touch with him.

Price had been going under the name of Herbert Clark, and had been working on the Natron cut-off railroad line above Oakridge. He had quit his job about a week ago, and had been spending much of his time with Miss Nelson.

PIONEER WOMAN OF DOUGLAS CO. DIED SATURDAY

Mrs. Annie R. LaRant, pioneer of Douglas county for more than a half century, and resident of Eugene for the last 18 years, died at 12:59 o'clock Saturday afternoon at the home of her daughter, Mrs. R. A. Booth, 1172 Oak street. She was 86 years of age.

Mrs. LaRant was born December 24, 1838, Fulton county, Illinois, and crossed the plains by ox team in 1852 with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alva Rowley, who later settled in Coos county. She was married March 16, 1856, to Narcisse LaRant, who died January 27, 1907.

Of this union 11 children were born, of whom seven survive. They are as follows: Mrs. Wadso J. Adams and Mrs. R. A. Booth of Eugene; Mrs. Geveline Marsters, Stephen A. LaRant, Narcisse LaRant, all of Salem; Mrs. R. G. Smith and Mrs. L. L. Lewis of Portland.

Mrs. LaRant also leaves 16 grandchildren and 12 great grandchildren. Mrs. LaRant was known all over the state, particularly in Douglas county where she spent a large part of her life. She went to Eugene in 1876, shortly after the death of her husband. She had returned to that city 19 days ago from a visit to Salem, where she suffered the stroke of paralysis that hastened her death.

The funeral services will be held at 10 o'clock on Tuesday morning at Eugene, and the body will then be brought to Roseburg, and will be placed in the family lot at the Masonic cemetery. Short services will be held at the grave at 2 p. m.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 31.—The demand for lignite, especially in the mining men, showed a noticeable increase in most districts during the past week, according to reports from 41 employment service offices in various northwestern states received here today. OLDFIELD DRAWS POLITICAL ISSUE FOR 1928 BATTLE

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 31.—The tariff is the prospective national issue between the democratic and republican parties, William O. Oldfield, of Arkansas, chairman of the democratic national congressional committee, declared in his address before Oregon democratic leaders this afternoon. Oldfield is touring the country urging democrats to organize in an effort to gain control of the house in the next congress.

The tariff, he declared, represents the essential difference between the republican and democratic theories of taxation and government.

At present, he declared, the country is being run for the rich, but to win in 1928, the democrats must represent a "sound liberalism" which will "protect the average citizen against the aggressions of corruptors in politics."

"The present administration," Chairman Oldfield charged, "is under the complete domination of the ultra-rich. COURT BATTLE IS OPENED IN OREGON BOND TRANSACTION

CASH DRAWER AT LAUNDRY ROBBED OF \$100 SATURDAY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 31.—Proceedings in the grand jury investigation of operations of Keeler and Roth in connection with the Oregon bond deal were held up today when John F. Logan, attorney for Keeler and Roth, filed petitions before Circuit Judge Tucker, demanding the return of various bonds, securities and other documents seized in the apartment of P. W. Keeler, Tuesday, as an incident to the arrest of Keeler.

At the same time Keeler was arrested his partner, John A. Roth, who was associated with him in the Rogue River Water Works company, was arrested on a complaint filed in district court, charging that they were dealing in bonds without a state license.

The documents seized in Keeler's apartment included about \$300,000 in securities, part of which were Oregon bonds.

Logan in his petition contends the arrest of Roth and Keeler was on a felony charge—operating without state license—and not a criminal charge, and that the seizure of their effects could not legally be made an incident to their arrest.

District Attorney Myers says the matter seized is of importance in their case before the grand jury in connection with the Oregon bonds and this cannot be carried forward until Logan's point is settled. The matter will be heard by Judge Tucker tomorrow.
