### OREGON TRUNKS. P. WAR SPREADS TO THE EAST

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
NEW YORK, Sep. 1.—Vigorous opposition has developed among Southern Pacific officials against efforts of the Great Northern railroad to acquire track rights over their lines into California. Within the past few days both H. W. DeForest, chairman, and William Spruille, president of the Southern Pacific who have been inspecting the company's properties in Ore-

gon, have issued statements publicly protesting against the threatened invasion of their territory. Large investments in new construction they asserted, would require the Southern Pacific to receive all revenue from the territory served.

## AUTO FATALITIES IN 57 CITIES LESS PAST FOUR WEEKS

48 in Seattle Since First of Year, 29 in Portland—New Bedford Has Low Record

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—Automobile fatalities showed a sharp decrease in 57 American cities during the four weeks ending August 15, the department of commerce reporting the total today at 369, as compared with 417 during the preceding four weeks' period ending July 18.  
From January 1 to August 15 the department's figures showed 2,878 deaths from automobile accidents in these cities, which was compared with a total of 2,855 fatalities in the period from January 1 to August 31, 1924. Comparable figures for last year were not given, but the total deaths for the entire year 1924, was 4,952, an increase from the 1923 total, which was 4,827. The aggregate population for the cities was estimated at 27,000,000.  
New Bedford, with but two deaths and none occurring during the last four weeks period, still holds the low record for this year among cities of 100,000 or more population.  
Chicago's total of 45 fatalities was the same as reported during the preceding four weeks—bringing its total for the year to 344. Among cities where an increase was shown were Los Angeles with 17 and 125, and San Francisco with 18 and 63.  
Seattle reported ten fatalities for the four weeks, compared with five the previous four; Tacoma two as against none; Spokane one against none and Portland, Oregon, two as against five.  
Seattle's fatalities for the year to August 15 were 48, Tacoma's ten, Spokane's ten and Portland's 29.

## FOUR BILLIONS U. S. MONEY INVESTED IN LATIN AMERICA

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (A. P.)—A study to determine the total and character of investments made by United States citizens in Latin-American countries has been undertaken by the Commerce department and completed so far as the first country on the list is concerned. Government securities of that nation have been purchased by North Americans to a total of \$292,800,000, while investment and ownership in private industry and enterprise amounts for \$190,000,000 additional.  
A preliminary estimate of the capital taken out of the United States for investment in Latin America places the total at \$4,000,000,000. England, with an estimated total investment in Latin-America of \$6,618,000,000, the department found, is the only nation more heavily interested financially in the Latin-American republics than the United States.  
The conditions in the English money market, the most important source of investment funds for the Latin-American countries, the commerce report said, "since the beginning of the war, compelled the latter to look upon the United States for financial assistance. The past few years have witnessed a considerable growth in American financial interests in Latin-America. This report discloses, which are now conservatively estimated at upward of \$4,000,000,000, or about two-fifths of our present total foreign investments."  
This amount is represented by the ownership of public utilities and the proprietorship of, or participation in, a wide range of enterprises such as mining companies, public utilities, industrial plants, land and cattle enterprises and miscellaneous commercial undertakings.  
"In Argentina alone, with which the report specifically deals, American participation has risen from a minor position to one important. Great Britain, which early took the initiative in investing in Latin America, has long maintained the lead in the financing of Argentine enterprises, especially railroads and other public utilities. The United States with its banks, meat packing plants, oil companies, and a variety of other undertakings, has reached a comparatively strong position."

THE CALIFORNIA OREGON POWER COMPANY  
TO OPPOSE PROPOSED NEW FREIGHT RATES WESTWARD  
(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
SALEM, Ore., Sep. 1.—Ed Osterlander, member of the public service commission, will leave tomorrow for Chicago, where he will be among representatives of a western committee opposing increase of freight rates asked by eastern railroads in an interstate commerce hearing there on September 6.  
The western railroads first asked for increases amounting to approximately 11 per cent, but later modified their application so that about 5 per cent is asked. Among other things they propose a uniform advance equivalent to 1 cent a bushel on grain, 15 cents a ton on coal, 75 cents a ton on gravel, sand and stone, and 20 cents a ton on lime and plaster.  
The carriers are demanding increases sufficient to bring them a return of 5.75 per cent on their investments, which they claim they are not receiving now.

Beckley as chairman, and the home economic committee, of which Mrs. Henry Lander is the leader.  
Can Douglas County farms replace a considerable portion of wheat, mixed feeds, potatoes and corn now shipped into the county from outside districts, was one of the questions brought up for discussion at the farm crops committee meeting Friday night. It was

## CONTRACTS GIVEN FOR INDEPENDENCE UNIT THE NORMAL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
SALEM, Ore., Aug. 31.—The building committee of the board of regents of state normal schools this afternoon tentatively awarded to George F. Reeves of Portland a contract for construction of a training school building at Independence, to be part of the state normal school which is located at Monmouth, two miles away. Reeves' bid was \$79,539, or \$10,581 lower than the next lowest bid. The award is subject to the board's approval of Reeves' sub-contractors.  
The committee awarded the heating and ventilating contract for the same building to Rushlight, Heston and Lord of Portland, whose bid was \$15,973 and the plumbing contract to Sturges and Sturges of Portland, at a bid of \$5872.  
The contract for electrical wiring will not be awarded until a further study of the bids has been made by the committee.  
The committee will this afternoon examine the architect's drawings for the new normal school building at Ashland. If the plans are approved bids will be opened in six weeks.

## FARM REMINDERS.

(From O. A. C. Exp. Station.)  
Growers who are using the paradichlorobenzene treatment for peach and prune root borers will not find it effective unless its application is followed by 10 days of 55 degrees, Fahrenheit or higher. The soil must be reasonably dry.  
In handling pears the cool night temperature is of much benefit. The temperature of Bartlett pears picked in the heat of the day dropped from 104 to 63 degrees when left out at night.  
Only a clear fruit juice can be depended on to make a clear, sparkling jelly. Cloudiness is due to suspended particles that cannot be removed by ordinary methods of filtration.  
Now that sufficient moisture has fallen to enable garden seed to germinate, it is recommended that farm gardeners plant many vegetable seedlings as possible for late fall and early winter use, including spinach, head lettuce, radishes, turnips, onion sets or onion seed, and peas and cabbage for next spring's early crop.  
The best head lettuce that will be available when the first cold weather of November and early December arrives will come from the cold frames in which the lettuce plants, set at a distance of a foot apart, will be protected by glass sash from unfavorable conditions such as frost and heavy rains. Make a sowing of New York variety immediately and harvest some solid lettuce by Thanksgiving.

## WESTERN RASPBERRY RUST DOES NOT DESTROY PLANT

Western raspberry rust is not serious enough in Oregon to justify eradicating the bushes, as viewed by Dr. S. M. Zeller, plant pathologist of the experiment station. No adequate control measures are known.  
The rust appears in early summer as small yellow spots on the upper and under surfaces of leaves. The spots are spore masses produced by the fungus that lives in the leaf tissues, and are sometimes so numerous as to cover the leaves with yellow powder. The spore masses on leaves and cane cankers become black in the late season.  
In its worst form the rust desiccates the plants, but not so seriously as to stunt the plants unaided by other causes such as poor soil and degenerative diseases. Infestation of new canes near the ground in the most serious phase of the disease in Oregon plantings. It causes cankers which eat into the cane causing brittleness. Such canes are hard to trellis and not infrequently break off in removal of the old canes.  
The western raspberry rust is not to be confused with the orange rust, prevalent in the east but seldom found in the west, which renders the plants worthless. This form of rust completely covers the under side of the leaf with an orange powder. This rust is perennial in infected plants, lying dormant in winter and breaking out again in the spring. Because of this the plants so infected should be dug out and burned, but this radical treatment is not recommended with the western rust.  
Taking out the fruiting canes as soon as the crop is picked will greatly reduce the source of infection. The old canes are cut as near the ground as possible. Where practical, the old leaves are taken out and destroyed. Otherwise, they are plowed under before the new leaves come out in the spring.

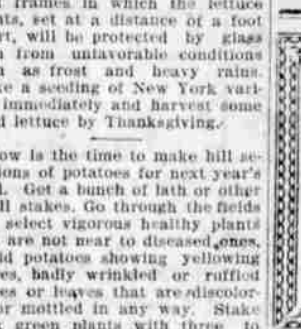
