EX-CONVICT PUT UNDER ARREST ADMITS MURDER

made at the jail to traffic officers Hans Blaser and Bud Crofton, Deputy Sheriff George Shearer, City Commissioner Kelly and Sidney Jenkins, a newspaper reporter.

THE DALLES, Ore., Sept. 3.—W. R. Lloyd, Oregon state penitentiary ex-convict, who is wanted by Polk county officers in connection with the murder Tuesday night of Clinton I. Baun, Independence garage man, is being held here following his arrest last night in the railroad yards here by James McCluskey and W. H. Kelly, railroad detectives. J. H. Hite, who claims that he and a boy about 20 were picked up by Lloyd in an automobile near Troutdale, is also being held.

Both men deny any connection with Baun's death. Officers seized a suitcase checked by Lloyd from Meiner, 16 miles west of here, to The Dalles. In the suitcase officers found a 38 calibre revolver with all the shells discharged, 125 rounds of ammunition, a blue serge suit, and a pair of shoes similar to those Lloyd was said to have worn before he left Independence Tuesday night.

Bloodstains were found on the right knee of the trousers taken from the suitcase, and detectives said stains were found in a corresponding position on the underwear now worn by Lloyd. Bloodstains were also found on the automobile belonging to Baun which was found abandoned near Meiner. The windshield of the car has a hole about four inches long, apparently caused, officers declared, by a mushroom bullet.

Lloyd was discovered hidden under a pile of poles in the railroad yards and when first questioned, denied that his name was Lloyd. He confessed he was W. E. Smith, but under a grilling by detectives broke down and admitted that his name was Lloyd.

He claimed the blue serge suit found in his suitcase belonged to Hite and that Hite put the gun into the suitcase when they were at Hood River. Hite denied that the suit or gun are his.

Bad Check in Evidence.

DALLAS, Ore., Sept. 3.—Sheriff T. B. Hooker and District Attorney Heigerson left today for The Dalles to bring back W. R. Lloyd, held there as a suspect in the murder Tuesday of Clinton Baun of Independence.

Another link of evidence that may prove valuable in the case came to light today in a check dated September 1, cashed in an Independence pool hall Tuesday, which was handed over to District Attorney Heigerson. The check was drawn by W. R. Lloyd on the First National Bank of Independence and was marked "no account."

One Man Job.

INDEPENDENCE, Ore., Sept. 3.—The coroner's jury, holding an inquest here this morning into the death of Clinton I. Baun, local taxi driver, who was found dead on the highway immediately south of Independence Tuesday night, returned a verdict just before noon charging that Baun met his death "from a bullet shot by W. R. Lloyd or his associates."

Sheriff Hooker of Polk county stated before leaving today for The Dalles that the case begins to appear to be a one man job. It is fully possible that no other person will become involved in the murder, he declared.

On his way to The Dalles to get Lloyd and return to the Dalles for trial, Hooker will stop in Portland and get a fingerprint expert to assist in the case, he announced before leaving here.

JACKSON COUNTY FAIR TO OPEN ON SEPTEMBER 16

Scores of fine animals will be an exhibit in the big livestock show to be staged at the coming Jackson County Industrial Fair, Medford, September 16 to 19. Of special interest to visitors will be the horse department. Pure bred and grades, ranging from cute little Shetland ponies to great big draft horses, weighing nearly a ton, will be exhibited.

The competition for honors in the heavy draft classes promises to be unusually keen, says Superintendent R. G. Fowler. While it is an admitted fact that the light delivery horse is virtually passe in the cities, it also is acknowledged that there is a bigger demand for heavy draft horses for farm work now than at any time since before the war. The fair management is seeking to encourage the raising of bigger and better horses on farms in this vicinity, and with this in view is offering premiums for such well known breeds as Belgians, Clydesdales, Percherons and Jacks, jennets and mules.

Farm school experts, specializing in animal husbandry have been carrying on a campaign in this state for pure bred horses for some time. It is the contention of these experts that a big, strong, well bred horse is the most dependable form of motive power that can be used to do the farm work. They admit that the tractor can do many things efficiently and economically on the farm, but assert that the horse is the only machine that can be relied upon to help with every kind of work which a farmer must do.

Diversification in livestock as well as farm crops is being urged by fair officials. Dairy and beef cattle stockmen are being urged to add a few brood mares to their holdings. It is being pointed out that a stable of brood mares will not only do all or much of the work on the farm, but more than pay its way with extra raised by it. From the time the colt is three years old it will pay its way with the work it will do, and, if it is sold, the greater part of the sale price may be considered actual profit.

Entries for the horse show at the fair will close September 16.

Death was caused by the heart and lungs being punctured by the steel frame of the windshield.
