ROSEBURG BAND WILL LEAD AUTO PARADE AT FAIR

SALEM, Sept. 4.—The Roseburg band, under the management of A. T. Lawrence, will lead the parade of automobiles entered in the Oregon state motor show, October 3, when they are driven through Salem to the fair grounds. It was announced by Mrs. Ella S. Wilson, secretary of the fair association today.

There is a possibility of the show being given on two days instead of one, according to Miss Alice Hankinson, who is in charge of arrangements for the show. In the event that dealers wish to have the show on two days, Tuesday will be the other day selected, with the parade and review before the kindergarten at the same hour as on Saturday. The actual judging of the cars, however, will not take place until Saturday afternoon.

Many local dealers have already announced their intention of entering various models of this year's cars, together with new fall models arriving from the east. The new models recently announced by the Ford Motor company will be displayed in the show, according to arrangements made with O. S. Latham, factory representative from Portland, who was in Salem yesterday.
