Van Briesen Improving—

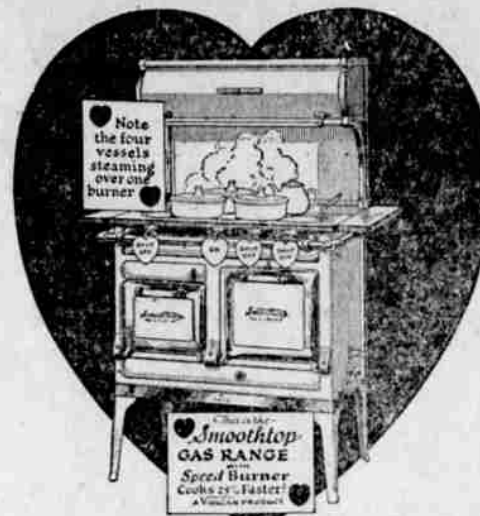

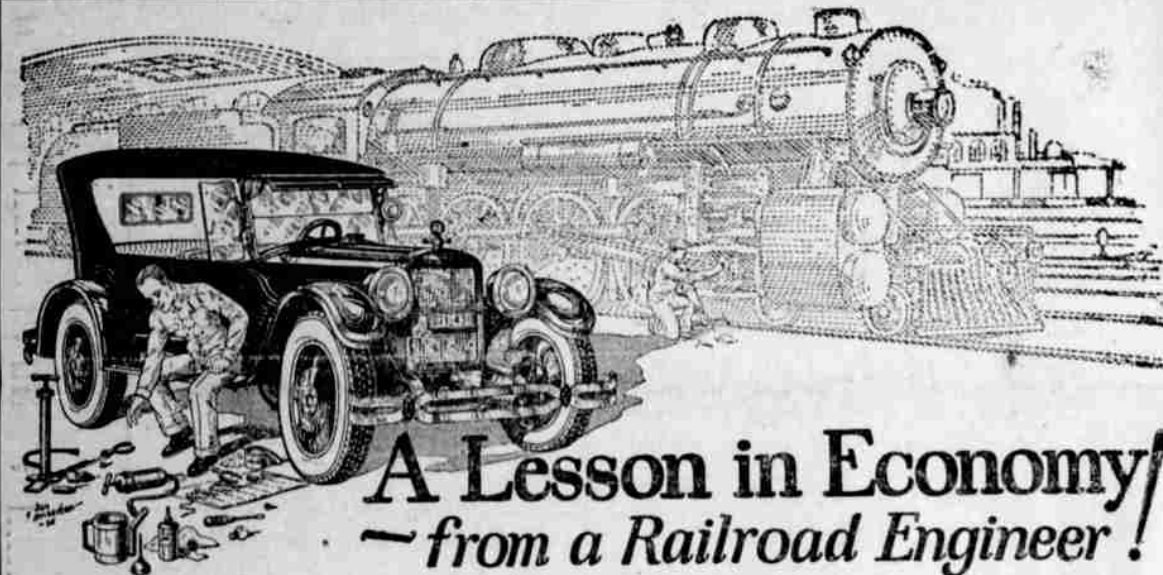

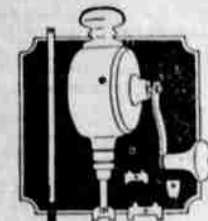

JOE DUNNE OPENS FIGHT ON KOZER IN PORTLAND COURT

(Continued from page 1.)

Deal for his efforts in trying to keep the registrations where they rightfully belong, as no motor association office is equipped to make a study of the state's resources and hand this information to the traveling public whom we are trying to hold in the state for a few days, instead of having them try to go through in one day violating our traffic laws and endangering the lives of our public.

"By coming into the Chamber of Commerce office for registration, they are interested in side trips, and are prevailed upon to stay in the state for an additional number of days, and often become settlers. "If Mr. Dunne were a man of his word, there would be no need of the motorists' money being spent in trying to straighten out this matter, as it was originally promised to me personally, as president of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce, that we were to have the office, and it was the Chamber of Commerce that put over the local branch.

"The Chamber of Commerce appointed a committee to raise the membership for a branch office of the State Motor Association. Unfortunately the chairman was called east on account of the death of a relative, and before the new committee got at work Mr. Dunne saw fit to ditch with one of our members and secretly arranged to have the office put in the other end of town.

"After the membership had been

worked up to a point where we could have an office, we received indirect information that the Chamber of Commerce had been sold out. I immediately took up this rumor with Mr. Dunne and he proceeded to become very insulting and dubbed the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce and the city's merchants as a bunch of "mossbacks." After Mr. Dunne had shown an inclination to be rather unfair in this matter, the Chamber invited Mr. Dunne and Mr. Koser to a conference to be held in Roseburg, so that this matter might be straightened out, and so that the state might benefit the most from it. But Mr. Dunne has not seen fit to answer our letter. If he wants to be fair and keep nothing under cover, why the reason for no meeting on an equal basis? We will admit that we may not be as big as Mr. Dunne thinks he is, but we are quite positive that we are working for the very best interests of the state of Oregon and the traveling public.

"After the three A. office had been located away from the Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Koser, realizing the efforts the Chamber had put forth and the work it has done in the interest of the tourists, he firmly refused to change the registration bureau, in spite of the tremendous pressure brought to bear by Mr. Dunne and his cohorts. The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce certainly compliments Mr. Koser upon his action for the interest of the state of Oregon, instead of bowing to two or three men, who are after personal gain."

DALRYMPLE MAY CONTINUE ON THE STATE'S PAYROLL

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 4.—It was current here this morning that Governor Pierce had assured A. M. Dalrymple that he would be allowed to remain as warden of the state penitentiary under the arrangement by which Dillard A. Elkins, chairman of the Industrial accident commission, would become advisory superintendent of the prison temporarily, could not be confirmed either at the governor's office or at the prison.
