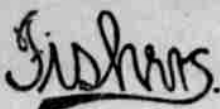

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 4.—Vice-President Dawes brought his fight for revision of the senate rules to the Pacific Northwest today, when he stopped here on his way to the first formal speaking engagement in Seattle, and delivered a brief replatform address to a few hundred persons who greeted him.
