IDENTIFY MAN AS AURORA BANK BANDIT

ASTORIA, Ore., Sept. 9.—Clyde "Whitney" Watson, ex-prize fighter and alleged deserter from the navy was arrested at the big creek logging camp near here late yesterday by detectives who stated he had been positively identified as one of the four men who robbed the state bank of Aurora, at Aurora, Oregon, on October 29, 1924, stealing \$150.

The identification was made by Miss Grace Patch, an employee of an electrical store opposite the Aurora bank, who stated that she watched the car in which the bank robber arrived and that she had an excellent chance to observe the three men who left the machine and loitered about for a while before entering the bank.

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 9.—According to advices received by Sheriff Bower from the Burns detective agency, Clyde Watson, held at Astoria for officers here, is charged with having been implicated in a bank robbery at Aurora, this county, October 29, 1924, when three men drove up to the state bank there in an automobile, held up the bank and made their escape. They secured less than \$500. The man drove away from Aurora in an automobile toward Monticello. They left their car beside a country road and made good their escape in another car, apparently awaiting them.

District Attorney Carson states he has been advised that Bill Gray and Slim Reese are being held as material witnesses, but has no knowledge of what these men may know of the crime.

OIL SHARES ADVANCE. (Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—Revival of speculative activity and strength of the oil shares, several of which advanced 2 to 3 points, featured the resumption of the upward movement of prices in today's stock market. With traders apparently convinced that the current stiffness of call money was only temporary and bullish enthusiasm aroused by the publication of another record breaking freight traffic report for the week ended August 29 and by the prospects of increased dividend distributions by some of the representative carriers, operators of the line found little difficulty in bidding up their favorites. Urgent short covering was again apparent in a number of high priced issues. West Pennsylvania company soared over 9 points above last night's close, Atlantic Coast line 8 1/2 and General Electric, international shoe, New York shipbuilding and the commercial solvents issues all four in five points higher. Buying of the mile centered in the Southern carriers in apparent anticipation of an increase in the Southern division rate tomorrow.
