WEEK DAY BIBLE SCHOOL PLANNED TO TRAIN CHARACTER

Under a special law in the State of Oregon it is now possible to give children religious instruction through the public school during school hours.

PHILLY HOPES TO CAPTURE PENNANT

(Associated Press Special Wire) NEW YORK, Sep. 10.—Two successive victories over the world champion Senators have rekindled Philadelphia hopes in the American league camp.

The hopes are based on slight mathematical chances, however. Although they are still trailing by seven games, the Athletics have pulled an even break out of the series with the Senators and their lethargy which extended through 12 losing games is ended.

The Maeks came out of a free-hitting game yesterday on the losing end of a 9 to 7 score, totalling 16 safeties off three Washington hurlers. Four pitchers were used by Philadelphia, Baumgartner finishing as the winning twirler.

In the only other American league game the Yankees bowed before the Red Sox, 5 to 4. Babe Ruth hung up a pair of doubles and two singles in four times at bat and drove in three of the New York runs. Mark Koenig, recruit from the St. Paul American association established himself at short with the Yankees, replacing Puzos Waininger.

Pittsburgh dropped the final game of a series to the Cubs 5 to 7, after an eleven inning fray. The setback reduced the lead of the Pirates over the Glimts to seven and one half games. Other clubs in the National league were not scheduled.

CALIFORNIAN SAYS LINCOLN ONCE APOLOGIZED TO HIM

OAKLAND, Cal., Sep. 10.—John G. Crouch, 82, believes he is the only person who ever received an apology from Abraham Lincoln.

Crouch was born on a farm in Rochester, Sangamon county, eight miles from Springfield, Ill. As a youngster he often went to the capitol with the farm help to dispose of produce. On one occasion he entered the stable on Lincoln's property and was leaving, when Lincoln arrived and searched his pockets, saying that eggs had disappeared from the place.

A week later the Crouches boy was told by his father to visit Lincoln's law office. This he did.

"You are David Crouch's son," said the future emancipator. "I wrongfully suspected you of stealing eggs and I want you to forgive me."

Crouch lived in Sangamon county 30 years and saw Lincoln many times. He often sold apples to Mrs. Lincoln. On May 4, 1845, Crouch viewed the body of the assassinated President.

CLOTHING SCHOOLS WILL BE HELD ON SEPT. 14, 16, 18

Clothing schools will be held in Looking Glass community at the Grange Hall on September 14, 16 and 18. These schools will be conducted by Miss Esther B. Cooley, Clothing Specialist from the Extension Department of the Agricultural College.

The individual equipment for these schools consist of a paper of pins, needles, thread, thimble, tape-line, shears and tailor's chalk. The workers should also take with them muslin or cambric pieces to practice slit pockets and bound buttonholes, and also some colored embroidery floss or yarn for decorative stitches. Old garments for remodeling and re-fitting may be taken by the workers, and when an entire new garment is desired patterns and materials should be furnished.

These will be all day schools and those attending should provide themselves with a noon-day lunch. Schools will begin at 10 o'clock in the morning and continue until 3:30 or 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

Schools in military are also being conducted by Miss Cooley in Sutherland on September 15, 17 and 19.

Both the clothing and military work have become very popular among the women and many are looking forward to these schools with interest.

The schools have been arranged for through the office of County Agent B. W. Cooney, and all women in the communities mentioned and adjoining communities are invited to attend as many sessions as they can and take part in same.
