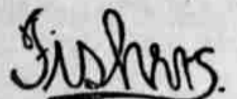

SPECIAL GAME WARDEN WILL GIVE UP STARS

State Warden Averill Says Special Deputies Are of No Value.

JUST WORE BADGES

No Arrests Have Been Made by Special Wardens and Many Just Wore Star to Show Authority.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., Sep. 10.—State Game Warden E. F. Averill today issued orders that will do away with practically all special deputy game wardens and will make enforcement officers entirely independent of gun clubs.

It has been the custom to appoint special deputies for several years, Averill said, and between 400 and 500 such officers now carry stars. Almost no arrests have been made by them and Averill believes that practically the only thing accomplished by their having stars is the gratification of their desire for authority. Under his orders, no more special deputies will be appointed, except on request of the commission or regular deputies.

All watchmen at gun clubs have also been taken off the special deputy rolls. This action was taken, Averill said, because the watchmen made practically no arrests and the authority was wanted by the commission was not interested. Deputy wardens are ordered not to shoot on gun club preserves unless under written permission from the state warden of the commission. This will keep deputies from sending their way into invitations to shoot, Averill said. Members of clubs have sometimes objected to having the deputies shoot.

PRES. COOLIDGE ENDS HIS OUTING

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Sep. 10.—President Coolidge returned to the White House today after a summer's outing in New England.

The president's train reached Washington at 1:18 p. m. after an overnight run from Salem, Mass., and found the capitol squirming and sweltering under the unbroken spell of mid-summer. A line of official motor cars was waiting at the Union station to drive the president and his wife to the executive mansion.

There Mr. Coolidge turned to the accumulation of national problems, which is promising him a crowded fall and winter, while the first lady inspected improvements effected by painters, plasterers and interior decorators.

MANY STUDENTS TO ATTEND UNIVERSITY

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 10.—One thousand and sixty-six new students have applied for admission to the University of Oregon for the fall term, a total of 144 in excess of the number who applied for the fall term a year ago, and exceeding the 1923 record by 244, according to Carleton E. Spencer, registrar. The number of applications and acceptances indicate that the enrollment for the university this year will be more than 2,000, setting a new registration record.

Among the new applicants is Frederick Warren Cozens, a member of the faculty of the University of California, southern branch, who will do work for the degree of doctor of philosophy, majoring in education and minor in physical education.

The pre-registration program for freshmen calls for their attendance on the campus Monday, September 21, when physical examinations will be given. The English examination is scheduled for Tuesday and the placement exam. closes Wednesday.

CREAMERY IN EUGENE WINS PRIZE

PORTLAND, Ore., Sep. 10.—The Eugene farmers' creamery, at Eugene, carried off first prize last week at the California state fair at Sacramento. Their butter, second 94, which was a full point above their nearest competitor. The competition was on creamery butter in cubes or tubs.

DOUGLAS COUNTY LAW VIOLATORS OWE HEAVY FINES

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., Sep. 10.—Five hundred individuals who have been fined for violation of the state game laws in the past five years and have failed to pay their fines, must pay up or go to jail within the next few weeks.

State Game Warden E. S. Averill announced today that \$15,542 is due from this source and Chief Deputy Warden F. M. Brown has been ordered to visit the various counties and take steps for collection.

Amounts due from counties include: Deschutes \$410; Douglas \$2295; Jackson \$675; Josephine \$275; Klamath \$14-25; Lake \$50; Lane \$425; Marion \$1150; Multnomah \$1670; Polk \$75; and Umatilla \$480.

Of the amounts due, half will go to the state game fund and half to the county in which the fine was levied.

Three years ago the state game commission got after delinquent fines and collected about \$10,000, said Averill.

The fines due have been unpaid by persons who were found guilty and been allowed to go by local magistrates. Prof. Brown, said Averill, have been paid, but have not been accounted for by justices of the peace, but he said the total of these amounts would be small.

FIRST DEER REPORTED

The first deer reported to have been brought into Roseburg today, reached here shortly after 1 o'clock. It was killed by "Doc" Martin and Nancy Mathews, who were hunting about 12 miles from Roseburg. They killed the buck about 9 o'clock and returned to the city with it as soon as possible, getting in soon after 1 p. m. With hundreds of hunters in the woods, and with deer reported to be very plentiful, it is expected that many slain animals will be brought in during the next few days.

STOCKMEN TO PRESENT ARGUMENTS TO COMMITTEE

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
BAKER, Ore., Sep. 10.—Stockmen in Baker county are looking forward to the hearing of the senate public lands committee here Saturday as an opportunity to present changes which they believe should be made in the federal laws governing grazing on the public domain.

"The stockmen has no rights, only a permit which is revocable at any time," Charles J. Shelton, secretary of the Oregon Cattle and Horse Raisers' Association declared here today.

"A system of leasing for a term of years would enable stockmen to put down wells and make other improvements, as well as secure the future of their business. Such a policy would eliminate much of the present dissatisfaction."

PENDLETON, Ore., Sep. 10.—The senate sub-committee, holding public lands hearings throughout the west, will be here today and tomorrow, according to E. J. Adams, secretary to Senator Stanford, who will be in Baker on Saturday. On Monday the sub-committee will be at Boise and at Pocatello on Tuesday. Beyond that point a definite itinerary has not been definitely established.
