COOLIDGE NOT TO INTERVENE IN MITCHELL CASE

WASHINGTON, Sep. 11.—President Coolidge expects to await developments in the war department investigation of aircraft charges, made by Colonel William Mitchell of San Antonio, and not personally intervene until the inquiry now under way is completed.

The president has been informed that the facts are to be established by the war department and it is the understanding that when the inquiry is concluded such action will be taken as regards to army regulations.
