MOFFETT CLAIMS ATTACK ON NAVY FALSE, SLANDER

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Sep. 11.—Admiral Moffett, chief of the navy bureau of aeronautics, said in a statement today that "charges recently made against the navy and its administration of naval aviation are false and a slander on its personnel."
The statement had a bearing on some of the charges made by Colonel William Mitchell, former assistant chief of the army air service, but did not mention the colonel's name. It follows:
"Now that we have buried the Shenandoah's dead and Commander Rodgers and his men have been found, I wish to go on record by saying that charges recently made against the navy and its administration of naval aviation are false and a slander on its personnel."
"I am ready to disprove these charges by testimony under oath. It is no longer a question as to aviation and the best weapons for national defense, but whether true honor, loyalty and respect for constituted legal authority shall prevail."

CORONER WILL PROBE DEATH OF W. C. T. U. LEADER

VINTON, Iowa, Sep. 11.—C. B. Cook, whose wife, Myrtle Cook, president of the Benton county W. C. T. U., was shot to death in her home Monday night, will be questioned at a closed session of the coroner's inquest today.
This was announced shortly before the inquest was to be resumed. Sheriff Whitefield Ruhl said that Cook had not given a satisfactory explanation as to where he was the night of the shooting.
The coroner's jury was also scheduled to hear behind closed doors the testimony of Charley Percifield, a day laborer, who, Sheriff Ruhl said, had made vague threatening statements while in an intoxicated condition last Monday.
The funeral of Mrs. Cook, whose friends have expressed belief she was slain by a liquor law violator, was attended by a large crowd yesterday afternoon including more

FERGUSON PRUNE DRIER AT DAYS CREEK DESTROYED

A four-tunnel prune drier belonging to Ferguson Brothers of Days Creek, was burned to the ground this morning. The fire started as shifts were being changed and was noted at once. Men employed in the orchards immediately hurried to the scene, closing the ventilators, and drawing the fires, fighting the flames with water. They had almost gained control, when the dense, suffocating smoke forced them out of the building. The drier, being of frame construction, and having been in operation for several days, burned rapidly, and within 20 minutes from the time the fire was first seen, it had collapsed. A few trays piled on the porch were saved, but everything else was a total loss. The drier was occupied by 200 bushels of prunes, bringing the total loss to about \$3,500. Some insurance was carried.

MISS MILLEDGE IMPROVING.
D. H. Pickens received word from Grants Pass this morning to the effect that Miss Gwendeth Milledge, who was seriously injured last week, when the car in which she was riding turned turtle near Gold Hill, is still improving, and if further complications do not set in, she will recover. Miss Milledge received two scalp wounds, the one in the back of her head severing an artery, causing her to lose much blood. The other wound is over the eye, and although it cannot be x-rayed until the swelling goes down, will probably not prove to be serious. FAIR GROUNDS AT YAKIMA RAZED

YAKIMA, Wash., Sep. 11.—Fire of unknown origin early this morning razed the state fair grounds, razing three of the buildings and damaging a fourth. The woman's building, about the best on the grounds and equipped with a number of glass cases for displaying exhibits and also holding some furniture, is now but a heap of ashes. The big dance pavilion, with its hardwood floor, is likewise a total loss, as is the women's annex and rest room. The machinery hall is burned on the front and roof, but will be used this year as it can be speedily repaired.
Secretary A. E. Lawson, almost in tears as he watched the flames eating his fine grove and the building that had just been repaired, lost no time in planning for his fair. It is understood that the state carried no insurance. This is the second fire to visit the fair grounds, the livestock barn having been burned some years ago.
