Stability is one of the chief concerns of the stockmen, and this condition is also desired sincerely by the forest service, Colonel Greeley said in his statement before the committee.

The chief forester said that the proposal put forward by the service to extend the period of permits to 10 years was made in the interest of further stabilizing the industry. He also conceded the right of the livestock men to have contracts with the government instead of the present permits that he had long contended for the right of the stockmen to take their more important grievances into federal district courts.

The court's ruling that the decision should be made by the forest service, he said. He recommended that small differences be settled by federal commission, appointed by the federal district courts, and that differences involving matters of fact or judgment be handled through the local advisory boards with the right of appeal to a state board.

The secretary of agriculture should have the final decision in all cases, he recommended. The suggestions put forward repeatedly by livestock men during the hearing that the area basis of using the national forests reduce the present per head basis was not accepted by the chief forester. It has some advantages over the present plan of operation, he admitted, but declared that it is impractical to administer successfully.

GENEVA, Sept. 12.—The allied powers today forwarded their ambassadors in Berlin an invitation to Germany to participate in a conference to consider the proposed security pact.
